

WM. FORRESTER TO AGAIN FIGHT FOR SOUTH PERTH SEAT, LOST IN 1917 BY OVERSEAS SOLDIER VOTE

Received Unanimous Nomination At Liberal Convention At St. Marys Tuesday.

ELECTION CORRUPT, SAYS CAPT. F. G. SANDERSON

F. F. Pardee Reveals Vain Efforts of Meighen To Hide Real Issues.

ST. MARYS, Oct. 11.—William Forrester, a prominent flax man of Mitchell, was the unanimous choice of the South Perth Liberal Association at their convention in the town hall here this afternoon. The meeting was an enthusiastic one and a crowded hall faced the speaker as they arrived shortly after 1 o'clock. William Forrester, the popular candidate, was the first to speak, and the building fairly rocked with applause as he rose from his chair.

"You are all aware," said Mr. Forrester, "that we are in the immediate vicinity of a general election. Four years ago you were good enough to elect me, but I never had an opportunity to fill the seat. You all know the reason. The Ontario Government annulled your vote and elected another man in my place, doing the act of the Kaiser themselves, which is just about the size of the old Tory Government. They are autocratic and want to do without the people as much as possible."

"Look at the enormous debt piled on your back, which you have to pay by the sweat of your brow, and if the present Government is allowed to remain in office, it will increase this debt from year to year where shall we end? The country will automatically go bankrupt. And now one word more: I want to impress upon the Liberals of South Perth the fact that if we become organized we can win this fight and win it easily, but we must all put our shoulder to the wheel and remain as united as ever before."

Must Work Hard.
"I have everything in your hands and assure you I shall leave no stone unturned to once more attain the result which I did four years ago. I carried the riding, as you know, but was cheated out of it. It now behooves all who are responsible to government to stand together and help wipe out these disgraceful conditions."

Capt. Fred G. Sanderson, the next speaker, briefly outlined his attitude towards the present Government. He remarked that this was the first political convention he had attended where ladies were present. He was very glad they had the franchise, for he knew they could not be swayed on the other hand. He said that the women of South Perth would do all in their power to help turn out the present Government.

"I have a confession to make," said Capt. Sanderson, "I was overseas during the election of 1917 and voted for Union Government, and were I today confronted by the same condition I would do so again. But there is nothing but Liberal blood in my veins. I have been opposed to the Government since the day of the armistice. There never was a more corrupt election fought on the face of the earth than that of 1917. (Applause.)"

"I have no doubt in my mind that Mr. Forrester won the election in South Perth and that his seat was occupied by a Government man for four years. This party, with its fancy name, call what you like, is the old Tory party camouflaged and dressed up in new attire to fool the people. But they cannot be fooled. (Applause.) This fight will be a strenuous one and more or less mixed up, with three candidates in the field. There is no doubt in my mind, however, but what we can win and place Mr. Forrester in the seat he won in 1917."

"Our Tory friends trot out the flag and tell us if we don't vote for them we are more or less a traitor to our country. They put 'God Save the King' on their advertising when it should really be 'God Save the Government.'"

F. F. Pardee, in rising to speak, commented that he had not spoken in South Perth since the last general election. "I was at the meeting," he said, "when Mr. Forrester was nominated; he ran a good fight and carried the colors high and he has his seat stolen. The same old Forrester standing for the same principles is today asking for your solid support to help him carry the Liberal banner to victory."

Tariff Not Only Issue.

"Wherever you go throughout the

country you hear Grits and Tories alike say they have voted Conservative for the last time. In 1917 we fought an election on the reciprocity pact; in 1917 we had an election, not a political one. This is the first election since 1917 when the people of Canada have been asked to settle matters of national importance. The Government of the day, Premier Meighen discusses that question, but that is not the only thing before the people. There is the railroad question and the extravagance of the Government to deal with as well as many other things.

"You are told to save your money and help to make the country prosperous. Tell them to start at home. The deficit on Government-owned railroads has mounted to an enormous height. We asked that a special committee be appointed to look into the matter. The Government sent men out to gather information, and now they tell us they cannot find a solution to the matter. A fine state of affairs, I assure you."

A Moss-Grown Story.
"They tell us if we were elected to power with our present tariff platform we would soon be over-run by the United States. That story is so old the moss has grown over it many times. They told us the same thing in 1911. This time these are the men whose policy is to absorb the United States. Direct taxation is also before us today, but I might add in closing that we are absolutely opposed to free trade. It is an excellent theory, but cannot be put into force. We have a future of prosperity before us, and it is the sacred duty of every man and woman to go from this hall a Liberal missionary and help to open the eyes of the people. You know our platform and what we stand for, so do your duty." (Applause.)

FLORISTS TELEGRAPH BOUQUETS TO NOTABLES
TORONTO, Oct. 11.—The Florists' Telegraph Delivery Association of the United States and Canada began their convention today by ordering by wire the delivery of baskets of flowers to His Majesty King George, to President Harding and to Lord Byng, governor-general of Canada.

Friday night has been set as the date for the inquest proper into the death of Albert Luce, who died in Victoria Hospital Tuesday night as a result of being struck by a train Tuesday afternoon. Coroner J. C. Wilson will preside at the probe, which will be held at central police station.

KIRBY WILL MANAGE LONDON'S AUTO SHOW
Montreal Motorist Is Choice of City Show Committee.

T. C. Kirby has been appointed manager of the London Automotive Dealers' Association's big national motor show of Western Ontario which is scheduled to be held in London in January. Mr. Kirby was recently given a post as justice of the peace for Montreal district by the provincial secretary of the Province of Quebec. Motorists of Montreal regard this an honor, for the appointee has been connected with them since 1910, and is secretary, treasurer of the Montreal Motorists' League.

Other members of the show committee are: Wilfred Hodgins, president; Frank McLaughlin, secretary; Tom Terry, treasurer; Jack Beemer and Jack McLaughlin.

Already a large demand for show space has been made by last year's exhibitors and others.

FEAR CHATHAM MAN DROWNS.
CALGARY, Oct. 11.—W. A. Stevens, a prominent grain buyer and son of N. H. Stevens, mill-owner, of Chatham, Ont., is believed to have been drowned in Chesham Lake during a plunge there. His automobile, containing clothes, was found tonight. He had been missing since Friday.

WILL PROVIDE FOR FORMER JANITRESS

Board of Education To Consider Pensioner's Case.

A surprise was sprung on some members of No. 2 committee of the board of education at Tuesday's meeting, when they were informed that they had been paying a former employee her salary since 1913.

Mrs. Harding, who is now in her 52nd year, resigned from her position as janitress of Great Avenue School owing to ill-health eight years ago. When her resignation was accepted by the board, it was decided owing to her advanced age, to allow her salary of \$21.66 a month to continue for a short period. The short period passed, and so did the years, but she continued to receive her salary monthly.

A short time ago the board of education informed the pensioners that they were underpaid and would be discontinued. This resulted in a letter being sent to No. 2 committee by Mrs. Harding, protesting against their harsh methods in depriving her of her only means of support.

Tears were brought to the eyes of the committee when they heard the details. A few suggestions were offered, and one member stated that he would do nothing towards cutting off the woman's salary. It was even suggested by another member that the committee should finance the cause.

Finally the matter was referred to the board for further consideration.

HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS PROCEEDING RAPIDLY

Progress is being made at Port Stanley on the harbor improvements which were undertaken by the Dominion Government. It is believed that there will be enough work on hand to keep the men occupied until weather conditions stop the dredging and repair work.

Dredging is proceeding steadily at Port Burwell, and the harbor will be put in shape for handling heavy shipments of coal. At the present time, it is stated more coal is being handled via Port Burwell than handled at both Port Sarley and Round Bay.

The renounce for the year at Port Burwell will likely total 500,000, practically all of which is used by the C. P. R.

ment, and also pay for the damage to his property.

Land Washed Into Coves.
Thomas Blanchard, who owns some lots on the corner of Elmwood and Wharncliffe road, wanted to know what was going to be done with his property. He said that the water from the storm sewers was being dumped onto it, and his lots carried down to the coves. And while the land was disappearing, the sewer came along and peering in the middle of a pond during rainy days. When the rain ceased they were surrounded by mudholes. There was a drain running through their section from Maryboro Place, and the sewage from this came into their cellars at times.

Uncomplimentary Remarks Made.
They had some uncomplimentary remarks to make about the attention marks to other parts of the city, where they alleged, high-class streets were being torn up to lay pavements, while they were getting no attention whatever. Mr. McKinnon, one of the spokesmen, said that the sewer in question had been promised for ten years.

Engineer Brazier claimed as a defence that this section was to be included in a general sewerage scheme for the whole district. Plans are ready and the cost would be about \$270,000. He did not think that he would be able to start the work until midwinter or next summer.

The committee promised to look into the matter, and it may be that something will be done to ease the situation.

Mr. Shoebottom, 260 Talbot street, was worrying about the farmers' horses. He says that soon there would be no place for the farmers to stable the animals when they come to the city. He wanted to erect a stable at the rear of his house, but to quote him, "The building inspector does not want it in that vicinity." He added that the building inspector lived a few doors away, on the other side of the street. The application will be considered.

Contract Thrown Up.
P. Mohan has thrown up his contract for a syphon line from Dundas street to York street.

The city engineer tried to get the Webster Construction Company, the second lowest tenderer, to take up the work, but Mr. Webster says he is not in a position to do so now, and new tenders will be called.

The committee decided that no cars shall be parked on the west side of Dundas street, Dundas to King street. The road was too narrow there.

A repair job on the Pipe Line road cost \$10; rounding the corner of Bocher and Wharncliffe road cost \$300, and a number of other minor improvements were done.

Engineer Brazier stated that after a couple more jobs were completed he may stop all curb and gutter work for the balance of the season.

"Goodness, gracious! That's a raw one!" said Ald. Drake when Ald. Childs said that on Dundas street east a couple of electric lights had been removed from poles and placed on buildings, and had not been lighted for the last couple of nights.

Engineer Brazier suggested that the method of holding contractors to tenders be changed. At the present time if a successful tenderer wants to drop a job he has not out more than \$100. He suggested that a bid bond or a guarantee check of 25 per cent of the contract bid.

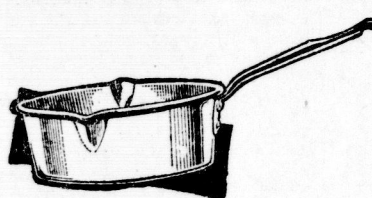

FAVORS SUBMITTING DAM ISSUE TO VOTE

London Chamber of Commerce Announces Decision.

At a meeting of the chamber of commerce directors Tuesday afternoon arrangements were made to meet the French "sample" train of thirteen cars due in London, Oct. 20. Count Arnaud and his associates will be entertained by the chamber of commerce during their stay here. The Alliance Fran-

caise will join in the welcome. It was suggested that the train, which is over 750 feet long, should be placed on the L. and P. S. siding on Bathurst street, while in the city.

The directors decided to send a representative to the annual meeting of the Fire Prevention League, to be held in Toronto, Oct. 18, and to the annual meeting of the Deep Waterways Association in Toronto, Nov. 1 and 2.

It was announced that the Guelph Chamber of Commerce had passed a resolution asking protection for investors along lines similar to those advocated by the local chamber.

The vote on the Springbank dam to date showed that the majority of members was in favor of asking the city council to submit the project to the people, in the shape of a bylaw at the coming civic elections, Dec. 5.

A meeting of representatives of the Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions' clubs and a committee of the C. of C. will be called shortly to talk over financial matters with the Children's Hospital committee.

The directors were favorably impressed with the financial position of the Western University, as put before them by C. R. Somerville.

The committee selected from the city council and chamber of commerce to deal with the gas question, made its report. W. Wilson, Cameron Wilson and G. A. Wenke being present from the council. A discussion left the matter in the hands of the committee for a further report.

FORMER LONDONER DIES SUDDENLY IN TORONTO

While preparing to leave his home in Toronto for his office, Monday morning, John W. Cooper, son of the late John Cooper of this city, was stricken with heart disease, and died shortly afterwards. Prior to the sudden attack he had apparently been in good health.
