Catherine Morley, One of Earliest Pioneers, Passes Away Sunday. SURVIVED BY CHILDREN

LONDON SUCCUMBS

Spent Practically Entire 86 Years of Life In Interests of City.

One of London's oldest citizens, Mrs. Annie Catherine Morley, 354 St. James hour Sunday. Mrs. Morley was born in London 86 years ago at the foot of Dundas street, where the sulphur baths now stand, and spent practically her
