Special to The Advertiser. Brantford, Sept. 21 .- St. Marys weakened in the final period, allowing Hamilton to net five goals and captured the O. A. L. A. intermediate championship, 12 to 6, here this afternoon. Smith, the outstanding star of the winners, only got into the game by the skin of his teeth, a telegram arriving five minutes before the game started, saying that he was eligible to play. He netted seven of the Hamilton counters, and in the third period slammed in the one which proved to be the winning taily. 

Chicago, Sept. 21.—George Herman ("Babe") Ruth of the New York Americans, pennant winners of the Canadian women's golf championsh Americans, pennant winners of the American League for 1923, was declared to be the most valuable player to his team, and was awarded the American League trophy for the season, having received the highest possible number of points, and setting a record that can be tied, but never beaten. Ruth was the unanimous choice of the committee appointed to select the American League player who has been of greatest service to his team during the championship series, registering first place on every ballot, one from each of the eight cities in the circuit, for a total of 64 counts.

How complete was the comeback staged by the Yankee slugger this year can be seen from the fact that in the 1922 trophy contest, which was won by George Sisler of the St. Louis Browns with 59 points. Ruth was not mentioned among the best eight bavers.

Ruth's name will be inscribed on the 1923 tablet of the \$100,000 monument to be erected in East Potomac Park. Washington, and presented to the United States government by the American League as a memorial to bosseball and a hall of fame for the greatest players.
