This achievement is another step towards the solution of many problems connected with refrigeration. The experiments were begun two years ago, following the discovery made by Professor McLennan that helium could be obtained in large quantities from the natural gases in Canada, especially in the district near Bow

Island, about 200 miles to the southeast of Calgary.

Helium was liquefled in small quantities for the first time in 1908 Evoy; vaudeville. y Professor Kammerlingh Onnes of Holland, but at the time little helium was available, and it was exceedingly expensive, costing at the rate of

about \$1,500 per cubic foot. In 1919 Professor McLennan designed and operated a plant at Cal-gary for the extraction of helium from natural gas, and showed that siderably less than ten cents per

The experiments which terminated so successfully today are regarded as the beginnings of an attempt to utilize industrially a gas that constitutes one of Canada's natural re-

Helium is non-inflammable, nonexplosive, and possesses 92 per cent of the lifting power of hydrogen, making it a most suitable filling for airship envelopes.


