DISMISSALS FOLLOW PROBE IN MONTREAL

Former Morality Squad Captain Discharged Following Refusal To Resign.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, April 1. - Roch Sauve, ormer police captain in charge of four police station, and at one time head of the morality squad, was today dismissed, following his

refusal to resign.

This was the statement of Alderman Brodeur, chairman of the executive committee, who also announced the dismissal of Constables Conrad Trudeau and Achille Payette, both of whom had been denounced by Mr. Justice Coderre in his recent report on police conditions. No "reasons," however, for the dismissals were the committee.

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In addition the resignations of Detective Captain Nazaire Forget and Sergt. J. H. Bond were "accepted" by

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
