Budget Debate, Ended—Government Carries Motion for Supply.

Estimates Under Consideration in Committee of Whole—Good Progress Made.

Estimates All Passed—Amendments to the Dyking Act Adopted.

THE House assembled at 2 o'clock, and after the customary opening exercises, the following was the order of business:

Reports The private bills committee recommended the application for leave to introduce a bill to amend the Royal Canadian Life Insurance Co.

Budget Debate Continued Dr. King remarked that argument was made on the part of those who had simply followed a course of evasion.

Mr. Williams (Newcastle) contributed a few bars to the song of complaint. His vote was \$5,000.

Mr. Murphy questioned whether any principle is shown in the appropriation between Lillooet and Cariboo.

Mr. Henderson criticised the estimate for advertising, stationery, postage and printing.

Mr. Williams moved to strike out the vote of \$750 in aid of the militia. He contended that in a peaceful country there was no occasion for such expenditure.

Mr. Oliver approved the motion on the ground that the support of the militia was a constitutional obligation.

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Rome's Power Behind Throne

Sensational Allegations That Papal Delegate Controlled Action of Government.

Restoration of Separate Schools Made Price of Boundary Extension in Manitoba.

Ministers of the Province Issue Statement Unparalelled in History of Dominion.

WINNIPEG, April 4.—(Special).—The greatest sensation was caused here this afternoon by the publication of an interview with Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of the Interior, in which he made clear that Mgr. Sbarretti, the Pope's delegate in Canada, submitted certain amendments to the School Act to Hon. Mr. Rogers and Hon. Colin Campbell when they were at Ottawa.

At the commencement of the interview Hon. Mr. Rogers emphatically denied the statement in the Toronto Globe that the Manitoba government was desirous of plunging the province into a sectarian quarrel.

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Templeman Has Faith

Thinks Grand Trunk Pacific Will Commence Construction on Pacific Coast.

Says He Has Private Information Indicating Morse Was Only Bluffing.

A Lively Debate in the Senate on Question of Mr. Hay's Letter of Promise.

OTTAWA, April 4.—The obligation of the Grand Trunk Pacific to British Columbia was the subject of a lively debate in the Senate today.

Senator Templeman said Mr. Hay's letter had written him to believe that he considered binding on the company to commence construction at the coast simultaneously with Winnipeg.

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RE-division of Electoral Wards. An important Recommendation Made to Council by City Assessor.

Submitted a Plan for Change Based on Property Value and Acreage.

(From Tuesday's Daily.) The important matter of the re-division of the city into three wards on the basis of land value was taken up at yesterday evening's meeting of the city council.

Mr. Rogers then goes on to say regarding Sir Wilfrid Laurier's silence: "What more natural conclusion can be arrived at than that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has made it his policy to abstain from the question of the Manitoba School Act, has done so because he has no objection to the proposed re-division of the city into three wards, which will give separate representation to the Roman Catholic and non-Roman Catholic elements of the city."

"I deny the right of LAURIER AND SBARRETTI to undertake to mix up the matter of separate schools with the extension of our boundaries, and I am sure so doing will not reflect the wishes either of Roman Catholics or of Protestants in this province."

"It is desirable, if not necessary, that the mission of Mr. Del Val should be renewed, or rather, continued, by the appointment of Mr. Del Val to the position of Roman Catholic assessor."
