But what did Premier Baxter, himself, say in his last utterance on the subject. After enlisting the members of the present hydro commission, he said:

"They recognize that the power at Grand Falls should be available in the first instance for grinding wood into pulp. Subject to that, they believe that those who desire to make use of the power should have an opportunity of purchasing it."

This may not amount to handing over the development for the benefit of the big interests, as the Times puts it, but it looks very much like it. The development of Grand Falls was undertaken for the benefit of the people in general—that all might share in the advantages of cheap light and power. But Mr. Baxter and his commissioners are not interested in the people or in what the people want. Their first concern—the Premier says so himself—is to see that the big companies which want power to grind pulp and make paper should be supplied. After that, the people can have what is left.—Moncton Transcript.
