Amend the Law.

But events, as far as they have gone, clearly demonstrate the necessity of an amendment to the law in regard to the collection of overdue taxes. The law is a good one which makes the municipality a preferred creditor. But in regard to the collection of taxes the law has given too much authority altogether. It is enough much authority altogether. It is enough that the municipality should be sure of its taxes. It is more than enough to give the municipality, in addition to perfect security for taxes, a lever by which innocent people may be harassed and made to bear the burdens that rightly should be shouldered by others. Taxes are a charge against the land and the buildings on it. The assess ment on which the taxes are based is made up of a valuation on the land and its buildings. It is to the real estate and to it alone that the municipality should look for its taxes. A law that makes all goods found on the premises subject to seizure is a bad law. It is a law that is inconsistent with our ideas of business. It is a law that everyone feels to be harsh and unjust, and as such is a law that ought to be repealed. When a mortgage is registered against a property the mortgagee looks to the land and to the mortgageor for the indebtedness. It would be considered a very high-handed law which allowed the mortgagee to seize the goods of other people which might happen to be on the premises. When we consider that the municipality gets in ahead of mortgagee or anyone else, in respect of its claim, we cannot but denounce as unnecessary and unjust the law
