BRITAIN AROUSED BY RELUCTANCE OF CANADA TO AID EMPIRE

SECEDE OR TAKE PART IN WARS, IS CHOICE

Gravity of Problem Facing the Dominions Is Discussed in London Times.

CHAMBERLAIN TRIES TO IMPRESS DOMINIONS

Britain Refuses To Face Reluctance of Dominions To Join European Tangle.

Special Cable to London Free Press LONDON, Feb. 2.—Discussion as to the means by which the dominions can take a fuller hand in the shaping of British foreign policy still flourishes here without anything practical resulting as the outcome of the debates, either in official or unofficial circles.

Everyone from Col. Amery downwards recognizes the gravity of the problem and The Times this morning devotes several columns to editorial discussion of the matter in the form of articles by recognized authorities. The only fact that has so far emerged is that the dominions are prepared to discuss the problem in the form of the Australian experiment of appointing a special liaison officer to keep the commonwealth countries with a developed part of the foreign office is regarded favorably and may be adopted by the other dominions.

No sign, however, with regard to such an appointment has as yet come out of the Canadian Government and no indication that the Dominion of Wales is prepared to make a similar move, which in any event would probably be opposed by Canadian representatives here, since they doubt the wisdom of Australia's move.

What the British refuse to face, however, is the possibility that Canada, as at present constituted, politically does not wish to become involved in European affairs.

The speech delivered by Austen Chamberlain on Saturday was intended to impress the dominions with the importance of the problem and to get them to subscribe to a revision of the protocol.

Chamberlain believes that he can persuade the dominions to take such course, but others of his colleagues are extremely dubious about this.

London a Four-Pound Loaf Costs Eleven Pence From To-Day.

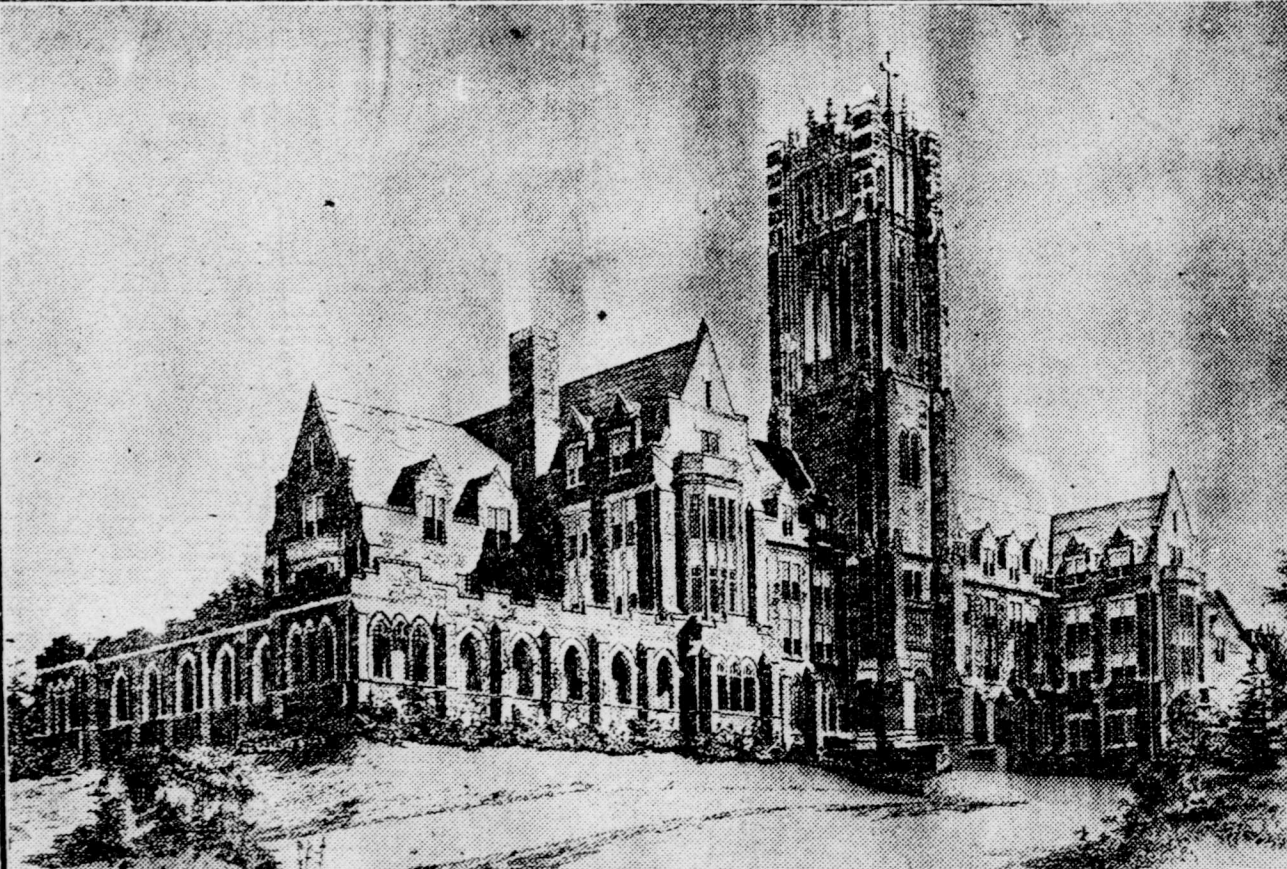

A pound-and-a-half loaf costs 11 pence in this city, or one-third more than in England.
