## When Forks Succeeded Fingers.

Table forks are a comparatively modern invention. They have been in general use only during the last few hundred years. They were first used by the Italians as early as the twelfth century, but it was not until the end of the fifteenth that they came into general use.

In other countries at that time the use of table forks was considered a contemptuous vice, and in 1450 Marcus praised the King of Hungary for eating with his fingers without soiling his clothes. In the sixteenth century forks were not used in Sweden, and at the end of the same century they were novelties at the French court, where the French beauties soiled their dainty fingers in conveying their food to their mouths.

Strange to say, our parent country England was one of the last among the larger nations to adopt the use of table forks, and Ben Jonson, in his play, "The Devil Is An Ass," says: "The laudable use of forks is being brought into custom here as in Italy, to the sparing of napkins." In monasteries the use of forks in eating was considered sinful, and was strictly forbidden, and it was not until Shakespeare had been in his grave for twenty years that forks came into general use in England.

## Health Hints.

Carrots are good for those having a tendency to gout.

Do not bathe the body for at least an hour after meals.

Rhubarb should not be eaten by "gouty" or rheumatic people.

## Canadian Briefs.

At Hespler bees stung a horse so badly that the attending veterinary says it will die.

It is said that President Roosevelt will tour Canada on the completion of his presidential term.

The total floor shipment from Vancouver last year amounted to \$76,486, of which Japan took \$82,000.

Kingston, Ont., Aug. 3.—Women are working in the harvest fields hereabouts, as it is impossible to get male help. They can run the mowers and binders while the men handle the hay and grain and store it in barns.

## POPULATION 110,000.

Winnipeg Is Annoyed Over Recent Census Bulletin.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 3.—Assessment Commissioner Harris vigorously assailed the estimate of Winnipeg's population given in the first bulletin issued from Ottawa, which fixes the population at 90,216.

Mr. Harris considers the work as done was a farce, and declares that the population is nearer 115,000, and certainly not less than 110,000.

Mr. Harris points out that the census was taken at the worst time of the year, when hundreds of people are away at summer resorts and their homes are actually closed up, so that it is impossible for enumerators to cover the work efficiently.



AUG. 14 Stations south of, but not including main line, Toronto to Sarnia, including Toronto.  
AUG. 17 Main line Toronto to Sarnia and stations north, except north of Cardwell Junction and Toronto on North Bay Section.  
AUG. 22 From all points Toronto and east to and including Sharbot Lake and Kingston, and north of Toronto and Cardwell Junction on North Bay and Midland Divisions.
