WINDOW ADVERTISING.

Windows undoubtedly help to advertise goods as well as to attract buyers. When the store is open and a customer sees desirable goods, he or she enters and purchases. But when the store is closed for the night it is not necessary, nor yet desirable that the windows should be darkened and curtained. Many dealers light their windows well, and leave them so lighted until the streets are deserted. This is undoubtedly a capital plan. It cannot attract customers at once, because the store is closed; but it may cause them to come to the store on the next day or within a week. Thus, the window is, if properly used, an advertising medium. If the number of probable window gazers is sufficient to justify the necessary expenditure for gas or electric light, then it will be a profitable advertising medium. In the larger towns and cities, this will undoubtedly be the case always. Strollers are always about, and impressions made on a person's mind in a leisure moment are not easily removed. Patterns and prices are noted, and when purchases are made these facts will be recalled to the purchaser's mind, and influence decisions. It is an advertising medium pure and simple, and must be considered and used as such. A window costs money, but if the money be judiciously expended, it will bring as great profit as any other advertising medium. Many dealers follow this plan carefully and persistently; other dealers taboo it entirely. But the observant dealer will make the experiment if he has not done so already, and watch and carefully make note of results. There can be no doubt whatever as to his conclusion, and it is only a fool who would go contrary to well founded conclusions.
