## We're On The Internet! CHANGE LEADS TO TRANSFORMATION

[This is the first in a series of articles on the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade's Info-Internet Implementation Plan.]

On July 26, the Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Trade, Gordon Smith, inaugurated the Department's Site on the

Internet. Speaking to a large crowd assembled in the lobby of the Lester B. Pearson Building, Mr. Smith said that the day was an historic one for the Department. "Our presence on the Internet," he commented, "is part of the Department's strategy to use technology to help achieve its

mandate. By establishing this presence, we have not only broadened the Department's profile in the international community, but we have also enhanced the service we offer our clients by providing them with instant, cost-effective access to up-to-date information on our services and activities."

The Deputy Minister concluded his remarks by saying that to make the DFAIT Web Service a success, we need to provide the InfoCentre with up-to-date and relevant information on the broad range of topics that relate to the Department's mandate. "The challenge for each of us," Mr. Smith remarked, "is to think 'electronic' when preparing material for the public - and therefore to provide the InfoCentre with an electronic copy of your text."

There are currently several Internet-related projects under way at Headquarters. These are all co-ordinated within the framework of an over-arching Info-Internet Implementation Group, composed of personnel from all key areas of the Department that have an interest in
