POTASH-REPRESENTATIONS RESPECTING DUMPING IN UNITED STATES

Mr. John Burton (Regina East): Mr. Speaker, in view of the United States Treasury Board's determination that there has been dumping of potash in the United States, will the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce indicate what representations were made by Canada on this matter and whether any agreement or conclusion was reached following consultation with the United States government?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): Many representations were made by my department to the government of the United States in this regard. I was just explaining to my neighbour some of the concessions obtained in the last days from the United States. There has been an improvement in the way the dumping is being assessed and an improvement also with regard to the period of time the anti-dumping measures will be applicable. Canadian shipments will now be examined by the U.S. customs to determine whether anti-dumping duties are applicable since June 18, 1968, which is a shorter period of time than at first anticipated. Dumping duties will be assessed against future imports of potash from Canada only if they are sold at less than Canadian Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of prices. So I think that this should give some satisfaction to the Canadian industry.
