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YOUNG OFFENDERS ACT

PROVISIONS REGARDING CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSONS

The House resumed, from Monday, March 22, consideration of the motion of Mr. Goyer that Bill C-192, respecting young offenders and to repeal the Juvenile Delinquents Act, be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs; and the amendment thereto of Mr. Woolliams (page 2381).

Mr. F. J. Bigg (Pembina): Mr. Speaker, last evening I was not able to conclude my speech because we reached the adjournment hour. I do not hesitate to continue today because this young offenders bill has been considered by many responsible groups across Canada and, although they welcome certain features in it, most groups believe it to be a hasty measure. It is believed that many, if not all, clauses should be redrafted by a committee before we consider putting the bill into statute form. Many groups have expressed a desire to appear to state their views. Since these groups represent experts in certain fields, I believe they certainly should be asked to appear before we amateurs give final approval to this legislation.

One group to which I refer is the Canadian Bar Association. The Canadian Bar Association has attacked the bill from a legal point of view, citing the difficulties experienced by members of the bench, members of the bar and jurists all across the country. This association has
