IMPORTANCE OF SUMMER PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS

Mr. Sergio Marchi (York West): Mr. Speaker, the cries of outrage over the cancellation of the Summer Works Program continue in full force. I recently received a letter from the chairman of the Public Library Board in my city of North York which I believe reflects the level of indignation felt over the regressive cut.

Last year alone the Board sponsored seven summer projects across North York, hiring approximately 40 students in the process; 40 students who had a job to help them pay their next year's school tuition fees, 40 students who acquired on-the-job training and experience, 40 students who received an opportunity to understand better and acquaint themselves with their communities and their neighbours, 40 students who provided a valuable public service to the community.

In my younger days I too participated in several Summer Canada projects. It is more than just a job. It is an extremely valuable life experience and an education. MANAGERIAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE GROWTH—TRIMMING ADVOCATED

## **ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS**

**IMPACT OF BUDGETARY CUT-BACKS** 

Mr. Jim Fulton (Skeena): Mr. Speaker, the people of Canada were deceived on September 4 by a group of perhaps well-meaning but obviously equally deceived Conservatives running for Parliament. Where on the public record were Conservatives espousing the values of firing wildlife biologists, dismissing the only wildlife pathologist in the country, closing off Canada's first center of toxicology, shutting down the herring gull egg project, smashing the project to monitor the effects of forestry pesticides on songbirds and migratory birds in New Brunswick?

From coast to coast there were no such statements. In fact we are forcefully reminded by the press that many members of the new Tory Cabinet, for example the Member for Hillsborough (Mr. McMillan), in opposition condemned the Liberals for neglecting Arctic research and cutting funds for the Arctic biological station at Ste. Anne de Bellevue. The same Tory now says that cutting deficits is a higher principle.

Each and every cut in the environment sector is designed as a signal to the corporate sector that the extreme hardline right wing of the Tory Party is in control. Let the Canadian voters beware. The Union Carbide crowd in the corporate sector are the determining factor for environmental decisions under the Mulroney administration. We can expect more endangered species, greater public health risks, fewer regulations on industrial activities that use the environment as their dump. Canada is on the road now somewhere between the Love Canal and Time Beach. We have the Canadian equivalent of Anne Gorsuch as Environment Minister.
