that all such payments appeared to be for professional services, they were none the less acts of bribery.

House Must Act

Another objection to portions of the report was made by Mr. Teller and Mr. Gault, members of the committee, who wished the committee to report that they had examined the charges on the facts constituting the conspiracy, but the evidence adduced before the house and left it to the house to take such action as it may deem necessary in the circumstances to protect its honor and dignity and that of its members.

There was no debate on either report in the assembly or in the council. The latter body, on motion of Hon. Mr. Chapin, accepted the report without comment. The assembly then decided to wait until their report was printed, together with the printed evidence, and then discuss the matter fully. It is expected that the debate will take place tomorrow.

Won't Summon Editor

In the legislative chamber this afternoon, Hon. Mr. Provost moved to summon Jules Fournier, editor of a French weekly newspaper, published in Montreal, entitled, "L'Action." Before the house for printing, an article in which he charged that Mousseau had accepted bribes because of the class of men with whom he associated. Mr. Provost claimed this was an attack on the honor of the assembly, and said if this sort of thing went on their backs would be bowed with weight of shame. Premier Gouin replied that he could hold up his head as ever in spite of all the accusations. The house declined to take Mr. Fournier's article seriously, and voted down Mr. Provost's motion by a four-fifths majority.

WORK FOR WOMEN
CAN BE PROVIDED

Registration Bureau Has
Number of Good Positions
Now Open.

The Social Service Commission issued a statement last night, calling the attention of the unemployed women in Toronto to the registration bureau at William Hall, 22 East Gerrard street. They have a number of good positions open for domestic both in the city and outside, also a number of applications for female help not of a domestic nature.

To date the bureau has received 160 applications for employment. Of these 100 were young married women and 70 single women. Positions have been found for 70, of which 50 were permanent, and 20 for work by the day or week. Five have been placed in homes outside the city.

Mrs. Wormald, manager of the bureau, says that the filling of these positions has meant a very great deal to the families represented. The bureau will do everything possible to provide work for all unemployed women who will call and register their names.
