C., applied for a postponement of trial on the ground of lack of particulars in the indictments, which prevented a proper de-fence being prepared, it being im-possible to obtain witnesses from England and Montana for this assizes. Mr. Davidson in reply intimated that he wished to use as evidence the state-ments made to English investors, to which Mr. Hellmuth objected, contending that it would be suicide for the defendants to proceed with the trial without evidence of the members of the English syndicate.
