For the Optime Class:

In the Phonisse of Euripedes, the first twelve books of Homer's Hiad. Hornec, Saliust Euclid or Legendre's Gesmetris, Hind's Algebra, Snowball's Trigo-nometry. Farmshaw's Statics and Dynamics, Herschell's Astronomy, Paley's Moral Philosophy, Locke's Essay on the Human Understanding, Whateley's Logic and Rhetoric and such works in Ancient and Modern History and Geography as the candidates may have read.

For the University Class:

In Homer, first book of Iliad, rucism (Charon Life or Dream of Lucian and Timon). Oter of Horsee, in Mathematics or Metaphysics at the option of the candidate, according to the following courses respectively. Mathematics, (rucid, 1st. 2nd. 3rd 4th, and 6th books, or Lagendre's Geometric, 1st. 2nd 3rd and 4th books, Hind's Algebra to the end of Simultaneous Equations); Metaphysics—(Walker's and Whateley's Logic, and Locke's Essay on the Human Buderstanding); Herseheil's Astronomy, chapters 1, 3, 4, and 5; and and the August Markey Course of the Human Ruderstanding of the Research and Husters of the History of the Research and Husters of the Richard and Ric such works in Ancient and Modern Geography and History as the caudidates may have read.

For the Senior Class:

In the same subjects and books as for the University Class.

In the 1st and 3rd books of the Odes of Horace; Euclid, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd books, or Legendre's Geometrie 1st and 3rd books, with the promblems, and such works in Modern History and Geography ac the candidates may have read: and that this Order be published every Term, with the Junissions of such Term.

Ordered-That the class or order of the examination passed by each candidate for admission be stated in his certificate of admission.

Ordered—Th. in future, Candidates for Call south honours, shall attend at Osgoodo Hall, under the 4th Order of Hill, Term, 18 Ver., on the last Thursday and also on the last Friday of Vacation, and those for Call, merely, on the latter

Ordered—That in future all Candidates for admission into this Society as Students of the Laws, who desire to pass their Examination in either the Optime Class, the University Class, or the Esnior Class, do attend the Examiner at Osgoode Hall, on both the first Thursday and the first Friday of the Term in which their petitions for admission are to be presented to the Benchers in Convocation, at Ten o'clock A.M. of each day; and those for admission in the Junior Class, on the latter of those days at the like hour.

Ordered.—That the examination of candidates for certificates of fitness for confusion as Attorneys or Solicitors under the Act of Parliament, 20 Vic. chap. 63, and the Rule of the Society of Teinity Term, 21 Vic. chap. 1 made under authority and by direction of the said Act, shall, until further order, by in the following books and subjects, with which such candidates will be expected to be thoroughly familiar, that is to say:

STANDING RULES.

()N the subject of Private and Local Bills, adopted by the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, 3rd Session, 5th Parliament, 20th Victoria, 1857.

1. That all applications for Private and Local Bills for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatsoever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,-shall require the following notice to be published, viz :-

In Upper Canada-A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties, affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspayer in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

In Lorer Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the presentation of the Petition.

2. That before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to this House, the person or persons purposing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give a notice in writing, stating the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a draw-bridge or not, and the dimensions of such draw-bridge.

3. That the Fee payable on the second reading of and Private or Local Bill, shall be paid only in the House in which such Bill originates, but the disbursements for printing such Bill shall be paid in each House.

4. That it shall be the duty of parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local matter, to file with the Clerk of each House the evidence of their having complied with the Rules and Standing Orders thereof; and that in default of such proof being so furnished as aforesaid, it shall be competent to the Clerk to report in regard to such matter, "that the Rules and Standing Orders have not been complied with."

That the foregoing Rules be published in both languages in the Official Gazette, over the signature of the Clerk of each House, weekly, during each recess of Parliament.
