The contrasted state of facts exhibited by these two books, and the details with which each is filled, supply the liveliest illustrations of the principles on which the foregoing discussion has proceeded; and while we can warmly recommend Mr. Hildreth's book for its own merits, we feel additional interest in it as a clear, copious, and faithful narrative of a career eminently fitted to suggest to us the evils which beset, and caused the loss of our former colonial empire, and the measures requisite to the preservation of the wider and more important dominion by which it has been replaced.
