cial industries. "The proposed agreement is so farreaching and introduces conditions so different from these under which Canada has developed and prospered, that the most careful study is required to even fairly estimate its future effects. "The committee feit a grave anxiety that the agreement might have such a serious effect on the development of our international and interprovicial trade, and in fact on our growth as a united country, that it was decided to obtain more information from different sections of the country, and to report the whole subject for the fullest dis-cussion before the executive council of

the association." Over twenty members were present besides representatives of several manufactories, who oppose the proposed arrangement. A number of telegrams and letters of protest were also received yesterday, altho the majority of manufacturers would be in nowise affected by the measure.
