

LIAMILTON LAPPENINGS

Negligent in Not Preperly Protecting Fuses-Cataract Power Interrupted by Sterm.

HAMILTON, June 27.—(Special.)—Coroner Baugh's inquest into the death of Jas. L. Dixon, which was concluded to night after having been adjourned from last Friday night, resulted in the following verdict: "We the jury empaneled to inquire into the death of one James L. Dixon, find from the evidence produced that death was due to electrical shock caused by coming in contact with a fuse or fuses, and we contact with a fuse or fuses, and we find negligence on the part of the company in not having fuses properly protected."

The inquest at Lowville last night into the death of Gordon Haggerty was adjourned by Coroner McCall until Aug. 2. The boy's stomach was sent to Toronto, but the report of the analysis read last night stated that no traces of strychnin had been found in the organ. The coroner's jury heard the evidence of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas and Dr. McClenchan of Waterdown last night, but no satisfactory expranation of the boy's death was disclosed.

During the interval of the adjourned inquest a further investigation into the mysterious affair will be conducted, and it is considered likely that a provincial detective will be called in to help clear up the matter.

With his mother lying at death's door as the result of taking carbolic acid on account of this disgrace, John Horning, a 16-year-old Tapleytown bay, appeared before Magistrate Jelfs this morning on a charge of stealing a horse and buggy from J.
