Paris, Aug. 25.—At the opening of the session of the Dreyfus court martial to-day, considerable comment was caused by the request of M. Grébillon, the principal architect of the headquarters staff, for permission to absent himself for 24 hours, owing to a summons of the Minister of War, General le Marquis de Gallifet, who came to see him in Paris.

It was suggested that the Minister of War wishes to refresh M. Grébillon's memory, which has been so strongly anti-Dreyfus.
