Teams from Canada may also be entered in regimental and company matches, and many of the members are eligible in the individual matches.

The State of New Jersey makes earnest efforts to comfortably care for visiting teams, providing them with camp equipage cots, blankets and overcoats, if desired.

The Centennial Trophy has not been competed for since 1877, when teams were entered from America and Great Britain, the latter team being in command of Sir Henry Halford.

In 1876 the following teams competed: Conger, at Pekin—the second that has been

On both occasions the American team were successful. In 1878 no teams appeared except the American team, which shot for the trophy, and it has remained in the custody of the National Historical Museum ever since. The match has been renewed this year, and an American team will be selected to defend the trophy, in accordance with the program, a copy of which has been sent you under separate cover.

We do not think the American team will have any advantage over any foreign team in the matter of arms, as you will note the rifles are restricted to the regular service arm.
