Old Provisions for Compulsory Arbitration and the Consequent Penalties Now Dropped.

MINISTER TO NAME ARBITRATORS

Expected That Public Opinion W Do Much to Bring About

For this purpose a board of arbitrators is to be established by the Minister, to be composed of three persons, of whom the parties to the distributions. pute are to name one each. READY FOR TARIFF WAR.

New Russian Tariff Will Be Weapon Against Germany.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 2.—The Novoe Vremya publishes an article to-day in which it analyzes the new Russian customs tariff, promulgated Jan. 28. The paper says the increase in rates over the existing tariff is 50 per cent. for the great majority of imports and over 100 per cent. for many important groups, among the latter being deficatessen and various manufactures of wood, leather and metals.

It is pointed out that all Germany's leading exports to Russia will be taxed under the new tariff 50 to 150 per cent. over the treaty rates, and in conclusion The Novoe Vremya observes that Russia is now sufficiently equipped for a discussion with Germany. The new rates, if applied, would seriously cripple mutual commerce, but the paper hopes that mutual concessions will obviate a tariff struggle.
