London, March 11.-Speculation regarding the military situation on the Yalu River is most keen, but no news of a reliable character has been received. JAPS AT PORT ARTHUR. St. Petersburg, March 10.—The czar has received the following message from Viceroy Alexieff, dated to-day, at Mukden:

"The commandant of the fortress at Port Arthur reports that at about 1 o'clock this morning the outlines of vessels, apparently torpedo boats, were seen at sea, within the area swept by our search lights. Our batteries opened fire upon these vessels. Our torpedo boats put out to sea at 2.40 a.m., and about 4 o'clock met the enemy west of Liestinia lighthouse.
