## **FAREWELL FUNCTIONS**

Receptions at Toronto in Connection With the Departure of Lord and Lady Aberdeen.

Toronto, Nov. 8 .- Two receptions were held yesterday in connection with the farewell visit of the governor-general and Lary Aberdeen to the city. At 2 p.m. they visited the new city hall and inspected it. There was a large turnout of citizens, and among others present was Mr. T. G. Mason. who witnessed the opening of the old city half 50 years ago. The ceremony took place in the main entrance hall. Mayor Shaw read an address expressing loyalty to the motherland and the person of the sovereign, and regret at the approaching departure of the governor-general and Lady Aberdeen, besides an interesting reference to the relations of the United States and Great Britain.

Lord Aberdeen, in his reply, voiced his appreciation of the kindly sentiments contained in the address, and the regrets of Lady Aberdeen and himself at their approaching departure. Among the sentiments alluded to in his address he said he could not help referring to that mentioned in the concluding portion of the address, in regard to the good understanding and good feeling between that kind of 1:49. triple alliance, "Great Britain, Canada Tr and the United States." (Applause.)
"When I speak of an alliance," he said, "of course you will understand that I speak of those common interests, those mutual concerns which necessarily bring us together, first in a close definite sense between Great Britain and Canada, and also in regard to that great country, the United States, to which we are contiguous."

## **WABASH CHANGES**

Probability of the New-Comer Scooping in the Air Line.

The Toronto street railway has decided to make an experiment in the matter of smoking cars, and will run cars on certain lines during certain hours of the day in which smokers will be allowed full privileges.

Mail Clerk William Black, who ran on the old main line division of the Grand Trunk between Sarnia and Toronto, died in the hospital in the latter city on Friday last. Deceased was taken ill on his run a week ago and was taken to the hospital, where he underwent an operation, from the effects of which he succumbed.

A St. Thomas dispatch says: The probabilities are that it will be only a matter of a few months at the most before the G. T. R. will turn over the entire Air Line division to the Wabash Railway. Indeed, for some time past they have been sending little, if any, freight over this division, other than that carried by local trains. At the present time there are only four freight crews stationed here other than those required to man the local trains, and they have received orders to move to Windsor. This will be a serious loss to this city, as the men have property here, and will mean a loss of about 50 to the population. The Wabash will issue a new winter time-table about Nov. 13, when two pas-senger trains will be discontinued.


