SCHEME TO HELP BRITISH YOUTHS

Young Men Leaving England to Get Certificates for Use in Canada.

London, March 3.-In the course of an address on "Federal Tendencies in Education," given by Mr. E. B. Sargent in the Whitehall rooms, Hotel Metropole, before the Royal Colonial Institute, and in the subsequent discussion, the rough outlines were sketched of a novel and exceedingly interesting scheme by which imperial aspirations may be fostered, and the ties between Great Britain and her overseas empire greatly strengthened. ... The idea is to form in Great Britain an association on similar lines to that which has been established in Montreal, known as the Public School Association, the object, as explained by the Hon. T. A. Brassey, being to give young men from this country who may wish to seek a career in the colonies an opportunity to enter upon that career without undue delay.

IMPORTANT DAY FOR HARRY THAW

Monday's Session May End in the Calling a Lunacy Commission.

New York, March 3.-The Thaw trial enters its seventh week tomorrow morning. It would seem that unless some radical change in the course of procedure occurs it will be at least two weeks, and possibly three, before the jury renders a verdict. ... The district attorney found the cross-examination of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw especially distasteful. He endeavored to avoid it by having experts testify first, and he proposed to get from them enough important admissions as to Thaw's present state of mind on which to predicate an application for a commission in lunacy and the suspension of the trial. Mr. Jerome realizes that he must be sure of his ground before asking for a commission, and consequently he will not take that step until some of the state's witnesses have been called.

SOCIALIST REBEL GRILLS VON BUELOW

Fires Broadside at Government for Its Campaign Tactics in Election.

Berlin, March 3.-Herr Bebel, the Socialist leader in the Reichstag, yesterday attacked the Government and the parties supporting it with wit, argument, indignation, sarcasm, and all the other resources of the most powerful speaker in German parliamentary life, rising to uncommon heights even for him. Herr Bebel devoted his remarks to details of internal politics during the recent elections, and to controversies which have arisen on the subject. ... Taking up the subject of the letters of Major-General, Keim, managing director of the Naval League, relative to the imperial chancellor, Prince Von Buelow, having sent \$7,000 to the headquarters of the league for campaign purposes, Herr Bebel said: "The imperial chancellor flew into a rage over the stolen letter, and put the members of the Government in the dock when he was crown prince. Such incidents often happen in the intercourse between states. Why were the secret funds of the empire recently increased from \$125,000 to \$150,000? Only to employ spies. Gentlemen, when these indicate a reactionary policy, I cannot refrain from laughing at the indignation of Prince Von Buelow. Had such letters been stolen from the Socialist party leaders it would have caused him much pleasure."

EAST ELGIN CONSERVATIVES Annual Convention of the Organization Held at Aylmer.

Aylmer, March 2.-East Elgin Conservatives gathered in annual convention here today. The meeting was well attended and enthusiastic. The election of officers resulted as follows: Mr. James L. Thayer, of Aylmer, president; Messrs. George Laur, of Aylmer; George E. Miller, of Yarmouth, and John Skinner, of Malahide, were nominated for vice-president. Mr. Miller was elected. Mr. Skinner declining. Mr. E. A. Miller, secretary-treasurer, was unanimously re-elected. The convention adopted a new constitution. There was considerable speechmaking. Messrs. Brower, Marshall, Beck, and Major Beattie being the principal speakers. Mr. Brower referred to the recent by-election in the riding, and denied that there had been a Conservative conspiracy to defeat the Liberal candidate by unfair means. He praised the power and school policies of the Whitney Government. Mr. David Marshall confined his attention largely to federal politics. He eulogized Mr. Borden's leadership of the Opposition and incidentally declared Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be a great leader. Hon. Adam Beck in the course of his speech referred to the recent Liberal victory in West Middlesex. His excuse for defeat was that the Conservatives were unprepared. With regard to the means by which the embargo on wheat would be brought to Aylmer, he thought a line via Tilsonburg, Simcoe and other towns would be feasible, meeting the loop at Woodstock or Paris. Power delivered in this manner at cost, and would be less than the present cost. In drawing his remarks to a close, Hon. Mr. Beck paid a warm eulogy to his leader, Hon. Mr. Whitney, whom he was proud to follow.

HELP RUSS STARVING American Famine Relief Committee Issues Appeal to America.

New York, March 3.-The following appeal from the Russian famine relief committee was issued today. "A terrible famine, unparalleled in severity and extent, afflicts the people of Russia. Through the utter failure of their crops millions are starving. The number of the dead and dying will vastly grow unless immediate relief is furnished. In this emergency appeal is made to the humane instincts of the people of the United States in behalf of these stricken fellow-beings. Let the response be prompt and generous. Arrangements are being made by which the money collected by the mission famine relief committee will go as directly as possible to the relief of the suffering without delay or duplication. FRANCE AND VATICAN Letter Says Paris Interfered in Visit of Alfonso to Rome.

Rome, March 3.-Authorities of the Vatican deny with emphasis the charges contained in a semi-official statement issued in Paris yesterday that Mgr. Montagnini, the expelled secretary of the papal nunciature, was active in trying to prevent the visit of King Alfonso of Spain to Paris. In commenting on the status of the conflict with France, they explained that the Vatican could predicate readily for the action of the French Government in making public part of the documents sequestered at the time of the expulsion of Mgr. Montagnini. It would be easy for the Vatican to publish documents exchanged before the rupture of the concordat, showing the anti-Italian and anti-British attitude of the French Government, as well as other documents dated subsequently, which tended to create embarrassment for the Holy See. For instance, showing that France influenced the Spanish Liberal cabinet to push the anti-clerical scheme of M. Combes, and promising French support to Spain's aspirations in Morocco to such a point that the Spanish Government, in order to please France, declined the request to take over the archives of the papal nunciature at Paris. When this was done in Paris, according to the Vatican authorities, tried to prevent King George of Greece, from visiting the Pope when he came to Rome in 1906.

MISS BARRYMORE BITTEN Actress Attacked by Big Dog While Going Through a Part.

New York, March 3.-It is learned that Miss Ethel Barrymore has been severely bitten by a large St. Bernard dog during a performance of "Captain Jinks" in the Empire Theatre. Although suffering from the wound inflicted by the animal's teeth, the actress finished the performance. In the first act, when Miss Barrymore makes her entrance down the gangplank of a steamer, just as a small fat dog, while two St. Bernards follow her. The other night, just after she had reached the stage, Miss Barrymore stepped too close to one of the St. Bernards, who answered her by striking her on the forehead with his teeth. Instead of fainting and creating a scene, the actress threw off the dog and went on with her part.
