SCHEME TO HELP BRITISH YOUTHS

Young Men Leaving England to Get Certificates for Use in Canada.

London, March 3.—In the course of an address on "Federal Tendencies in Education," given by Mr. E. B. Sargent in the Whitehall rooms, Hotel Metropole, before the Royal Colonial Institute, and in the subsequent discussion, the rough outlines were sketched of a novel and exceedingly interesting scheme by which imperial aspirations may be fostered, and the ties between Great Britain and her overseas empire greatly strengthened.

The idea is to form in Great Britain an association on similar lines to that which has been established in Montreal, known as the Public School Association, the object, as explained by the Hon. T. A. Brassey, being to give young men from this country who wish to seek a career in the colonies an opportunity to enter upon that career without undue delay.

Those who are to be selected will have to possess a certificate from the master of the school in which they studied, and this certificate will be an assurance to the colonial authorities that the bearer is in every way worthy of confidence, advice and assistance in obtaining employment. It will, in short, be a certificate of bona fides, and a proof that the master of the school has not only left school without a stain on his character, but also that he has passed through the probationary period immediately after school, say of eighteen months or two years, learning a profession or calling with credit.

The newly-formed association in Canada is prepared to give a helping hand to all such young Britons, and it is fully recognized in Canada that the coming of such highly-qualified youths to the Dominion is in the highest degree to be desired. The advocates of this plan of federal education pointed out that hardly anything could be devised which would so admirably effect the grand purpose of all true imperialism, namely, the bringing into close touch of the educated, trained young men of Great Britain with their colleagues in Canada, Australia and the other portions of the empire.

Annual Convention of the Organization Held at Aylmer.

Aylmer, March 2.—East Elgin Conservatives gathered in annual convention here today.

The meeting was well attended and enthusiastic. The election of officers resulted as follows:

Mr. James L. Thayer, of Aylmer, president.

Messrs. George Laur, of Aylmer; George Miller, of Yarmouth, and John Skinner, of Malahide, were nominated for vice-president. Mr. Miller was elected. Mr. Skinner declining.

Mr. E. A. Miller, secretary-treasurer, was unanimously re-elected.

The convention adopted a new constitution.

There was considerable speechmaking. Messrs. Brower, Marshall, Beck and Major Beattie being the principal speakers. Mr. Brower referred to the recent by-election in the riding, and denied that there had been a Conservative conspiracy to defeat the Liberal candidate by unfair means. He praised the power and school policies of the Whitney Government.

Mr. David Marshall confined his attention largely to federal politics. He eulogized Mr. Borden's leadership of the Opposition and incidentally declared Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be a great leader.

Hon. Asd. Beck in the course of his speech referred to the recent Liberal victory in West Middlesex. His excuse for defeat was that the Conservatives were unprepared.

With regard to the means by which the power would be brought to Aylmer, he thought a line via Tillsonburg, Simcoe and other towns would be feasible, meeting the loop at Woodstock or Paris. Power delivered in Aylmer would be more expensive than at points nearer the falls. But it would be delivered at cost, and would be less than the present cost.

In drawing his remarks to a close, Hon. Mr. Beck paid a warm eulogy to his leader, Hon. Mr. Whitney, whom he was proud to follow.

IMPORTANT DAY FOR HARRY THAW

Monday's Session May End in the Calling a Lunacy Commission.

New York, March 3.—The Thaw trial enters its seventh week tomorrow morning. It would seem that unless some radical change in the course of procedure occurs it will not last more than two or three weeks, before the jury renders a verdict.

That District Attorney Jerome has no intention of letting the case go to the jury if he can possibly prevent it, appears to be no longer in doubt. The prosecutor has made it plain ever since the trial started that with the consent of the defense he would gladly have the matter come before a commission in lunacy rather than before a court of law. Mr. Jerome does not believe that Thaw is in a proper condition of mind to be on trial. Time after time, when Delphin Delmas, the leading attorney for the defense, has interrupted him during his cross-examination of witnesses with objections of various kinds, Mr. Jerome retorted hotly: "You formed me into this."

The district attorney found the cross-examination of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw especially distasteful. He endeavored to avoid it by having experts testify first, and he proposed to get from them enough important admissions as to Thaw's present state of mind on which to predicate an application for a commission in lunacy and the suspension of the trial. Mr. Jerome realizes that he must be sure of his ground before asking for a commission, and consequently he will not take that step until some of the state's alienists have gone upon the stand. It is believed that these alienists will be called upon to testify simply as to the continuing effect of the forms of insanity which Thaw's experts have testified he was suffering from prior to and at the time of the killing of Stanford White. They will also testify as to their observation of Thaw in the courtroom. Dr. Allan McLane Hamilton, who was employed for a time by the defense and who visited Thaw in the Tombs, it is expected, will be the most important expert witness for the prosecution. Dr. Hamilton is known to have expressed the opinion that Thaw's insanity was of a lasting character.

Mr. Jerome was laying the foundation for Dr. Hamilton's testimony when adjournment was taken Friday afternoon. He asked Dr. Evans, witness for the defense, if Dr. Hamilton was not regarded as high authority on nervous diseases. Dr. Evans refused to answer, and Justice Fitzgerald took the point under consideration. The judge also reserved decision on the question raised by Mr. Jerome whether or not he could be permitted to quote from various medical works as to the effects of various mental diseases.

Thaw seems apprehensive of his fate only as it relates to an asylum for the criminal insane. The thought of the death chair, it is said, has never once entered his mind. He has been in constant fear, however, that there might be a "conspiracy" to "railroad" him to an asylum. Within the last two days he has asked his attorneys for assurances that they will not enter into any agreement with the district attorney for an appointment of a commission. They promised him to fight to the utmost to have the case passed upon by the jury.

Dr. Britton D. Evans, who declared Thaw suffered from a brainstorm when he shot White, will again go upon the stand tomorrow morning, which will be his fourth day under cross-examination.

Mr. David Marshall confined his attention largely to federal politics. He eulogized Mr. Borden's leadership of the Opposition and incidentally declared Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be a great leader.

Hon. Asd. Beck in the course of his speech referred to the recent Liberal victory in West Middlesex. His excuse for defeat was that the Conservatives were unprepared.
