LOCAL MARKET.

Tuesday, July 18.
Although the market today was not as well attended by the farmers as a week ago, nevertheless it was a creditable one in every respect. Sales were brisk and prices were fairly well maintained in nearly every line. The feature of the market was the large supply of hay. The loads at present are in pretty good condition, and as the farmers now realize that they are not going to get the fancy prices that they predicted last fall, they are bringing it in.

Grain—Oats were in good demand; the supply was not as large as yesterday. Sales were made at \$1.52 to \$1.53 per cwt. Wheat sold at \$2.20 per bushel and one load of barley went at \$1.35 per cwt.

Hay and Straw—There were about 47 loads of hay offered today. The demand was fair at \$14 to \$15 per ton. Only a few choice loads sold at the higher figure, and the lower price was paid for inferior loads. Straw sold quickly at \$3 and \$5 50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was not quite as firm as was the case at Saturday's market. Sales were made at 25c to 26c for pound rolls according to quality. Eggs sold well at 23c per dozen for the basket lots.

Vegetables and Roots—Potatoes were in large supply and prices were easier at 85c to 90c per bag. Rhubarb sold quickly at \$1 per dozen. Lettuce dull at 40c to 45c. Onions, 90c per bushel. Cabbages, 40c to 45c per dozen.

Apples—Trade is very slow, and prices easier at \$1.25 to \$1.75 per barrel, or 40c to 75c per bag.

Poultry—Turkeys sold at 13c to 15c per pound, dressed; chickens, 10c per pound, alive, or 11c to 12c, dressed; old hens, 8c to 9c alive, or 10c, dressed; ducks, 10c alive, or 12c, dressed.

Dressed Hogs—The supply was not large; sales were brisk, and nearly all sold at \$7 per cwt. and 12c.

Butchers' Meat—Beef sold at \$6.50 to \$7.50; veal in fair demand at \$7.50 to \$8.50; lamb, 11c per pound for the carcass. Pork sold at 9c for hindquarters, and 8c for fore quarters.

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GREAT CALVE IN
SPLENDID VOICE

Famous Prima Donna Chorus a Large Audience at the Grand.

A rare and notable event in the history of music in London was the appearance of Mdle. Emma Calve before a large and representative audience in the Grand Opera House last evening.

Mdle. Calve, who is possessed of a most attractive and charming personality, was gown in shimmering black sequins over white chiffon and tulle. She wore a single strand of large, perfectly matched pearls, some beautiful diamond ornaments, and a magnificent stole of Russian sable, which reached quite to the foot of her gown.

The draughtiness of the stage worried the great singer during her opening numbers, and a ripple of laughter ran through the house, when, with a characteristically French gesture, she ran down to the footlights and held out her hands as if to gather some warmth from their deceptive glow.

The brilliant artist's first number was Charming Oiseau, from David's "Pearl of Brazil," and the difficult runs, cadenzas and trills were taken with an absence of effort and a flute-like quality of voice that aroused the greatest enthusiasm in her hearers.

In response to a vociferous encore, Gounod's exquisite Serenade was given, with a velvet softness and languor which was the essence of art.

Still the audience refused to be satisfied, and Mdle. Calve very graciously responded with one verse of "Way Down Upon the Suwannee River" and then "Annie Laurie."

The prima donna's second number was the beautiful aria from Saint-Saens's "Samson et Delilah," "Mon Coeur s'ouvre a l'exterieur," and the first encore to this was Gounod's "Printemps," which was sung with delightful smoothness of phrasing.

"Comin' Thro' the Rye," as a third encore, was rendered with an arch coquetry altogether charming, while the last encore, an old Spanish song, was given with a verve and dramatic force that was inspiring.

M. Camille Decresus made a very favorable impression with his delicate interpretation of Liszt's "St. Francis Walking on the Waves," and his encore number was a pretty little Italian dance, an impression which was deepened by his artistic and sympathetic accompaniments.

Mdle. Renee Chemet, the violinist, was the recipient of an ovation. Sel-dom has a more accomplished artist been heard in London. Her bowing and technique were remarkable, as her manner and presence were charming. In her "Adagio" by Bruch, and "Ronde" by Lalo, Mdle. Chemet scored a decided success.

Possibly the weakest member of the company was M. D'Aubigne, whose voice, while beautifully trained, was scarcely full and robust enough for his position in the supporting company of such an eminent artist.

The audience, however, seemed to like M. D'Aubigne's work, and his first number, Verdi's "Rigoletto," received a double encore. His second number was Wagner's "Preislied," to which Bemberg's "A Toi" was given, as an encore.

The second part of the programme, which was most interesting to number of people, was a scene from the second act of "Carmen."

It is universally conceded by critics the world over that Calve does not play Carmen—she is Carmen. By turns alluring, seductive, fascinating, coquettish or violent, her interpretation left nothing to be desired, and a wealth of dramatic expression was revealed in every tone, every gesture.

M. D'Aubigne was acceptable as Don Jose. The concert, as a whole, was a musical treat, seldom afforded to Londoners.

C. M. A. TO SECURE
BRITISH CAPITAL

Old Country Loan Companies Will Be Asked To Establish Branches Here.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—British capital for railroad enterprises and manufacturing concerns, will be secured in England, by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

This was decided upon at a meeting tonight. The association will endeavor to have the British loan companies establish branches in Canada for the investment of home capital. It was pointed out that they accept a smaller rate of interest at home than here, and it is thought they would be willing to accept a lower rate than is now paid in Canada.

It is pointed out that many industries are kept back because of lack of obtainable capital.

LED DAUGHTER ASTRAY
Toronto Woman Sentenced for Shoplifting, But Companion Goes Free.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—Because the Magistrate believed that she had led her daughter astray, Mrs. Mary Middleton was sentenced this morning to 60 days in jail for shoplifting. The woman was caught with her daughter, Mrs. Alice Wilson, in the T. Eaton store. The latter had a 2-months-old baby in her arms at the time. The magistrate allowed Mrs. Wilson to go on suspended sentence, as she has four children, and her husband is a hard-working man. He considered, however, that Mrs. Middleton should not have brought the daughter into such trouble, so he sent her to jail.

DEATH OF MR. T. H. MILLER
An Old and Esteemed Resident of South London Dies Suddenly.

Mr. Thomas H. Miller, an old and esteemed resident of South London, passed away at his home, 76 Askin street, last night, after an illness of only a few days. Mr. Miller was 73 years old, and came to this city from near St. Mary's about 27 years ago. Besides his wife, four sons and one daughter survive—George W. and Alfred, of this city; H. A. Miller, of Vancouver, N. Y.; N. W. Miller, of Magdalen, New Mexico, and Miss L. Miller, of the Wesley Memorial Hospital, in Washington. The funeral will take place on Thursday to Woodland Cemetery.

CHARGED WITH ASSAULT
Four Hamilton Men Said to Have Made Brutal Attack on Girl.

Kingston, Ont., Feb. 17.—Two men named Devine and Crozier, for criminal assault, and two others named Miller and Brickwood, for attempted criminal assault, were sent up for trial by Police Magistrate Farrell today. Mary Topping, aged 17 years, a domestic out of work, is the accused. She alleged she was beaten and assaulted in a coal shed into which she was dragged after being choked by the young men.

AGAINST FOY'S BILL
Law Associations Send In Protests Against Proposed Reforms.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—It is not likely that the proposed Government resolution, looking to a measure of law reform will be introduced in the Legislature at once. The Attorney-General has received a number of communications from law associations of the Province, in which are presented arguments against the proposed reform bill. night, and after passing through the whole outfit, landed right up against the goalkeeper with no one to check him. The audience held their breaths and made the right kind of faces, but there was that goalkeeper again. Several times Casselman and the others repeated these trips down the ice, but without result.

And the rushing was not altogether on London's side. Maloney, at point, Bernhardt, at cover, and Rahn, the rover, of the Preston aggregation, all rushed time and time again. There was a difference, though—Casselman and Thompson were never caught away from home when they called, and forced each rush on the part of Preston into a premature shot. Long shots are poor play now, and proved so for Preston last night.

It would be safe to say that London's forwards had two shots to Preston's one during the last four minutes' play, and each shot dead on, but there seemed to be no chance.

As a rule, when a forward player, who can shoot as London's apparent, can get through and finds the goalkeeper all alone, he scores, unless the defender of the nets takes him unawares, skates off, checks him, or when the Preston man did not do it. London's luck had been good, and her forwards had landed every opportunity which occurred in the above manner last night, the score would have been 4 to 6, instead of as it was, 10 to 6.

"RED" BOMBS KILL AND MAIM START TALK OF KING'S DEATH

Madrid, Feb. 18.—There is no truth in the report current in Paris last night that King Alfonso had been assassinated. The rumor probably was an outgrowth of the bomb explosions at Barcelona yesterday, which now appears to have been the work of anarchists.

In addition to killing one man and dangerously wounding another and a child, the explosions caused much damage to neighboring buildings.

The precise object of the outrages has not yet been made clear, but it is interesting to note that the factions of the parliamentary opposition recently united in a request to the Government to restore the constitutional guarantees in Barcelona, declaring that normal conditions prevailed there.

King Alfonso is at Seville.
