

FITZPATRICK'S FIFTEEN SOCIAL JOB MEANS ONE DEMOCRATS OUT MORE \$7,000 DIP ON HEAVY BAIL

Will Walk Away With Hand-
some Pension as Retired
Judge.

NICE WAY "UNION" HAS
Could Have Given Quebec
Man Appointment and
Saved Money.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—The most recent
Union Government appointment cannot
be said to have created any degree of
enthusiasm at the capital. Some sur-
prise is in the first place felt that Sir
Charles Fitzpatrick should accept a
transfer from the high position of chief
justice of the highest court in Canada,
of acting administrator of the Dominion
and of Canada's representative on the
Judicial committee of the imperial privy
council, to the comparatively humble
post of lieutenant-governor of Quebec.
The first is a life position, the second
for five years only. Moreover, Sir
Charles is an Irishman, and the province
which he will now administer over is
French-Canadian.

Gives Up "Side Lines."
From the purely monetary standpoint
the transfer would not appear to be
advantageous. Both positions carry an
annual emolument of \$10,000, but in his
former position Sir Charles received an
extra emolument for acting as adminis-
trator in the absence of the governor-
general, while the Quebec government
appropriated a sum of \$2,000 a year in
order to defray expenses incurred while
in attendance at the privy council in
England.

For drawing the amount, in spite of
the fact that since the war he has
seldom been in England, Sir Charles
last season came in for severe criticism
at the hands of Dr. Edwards of Fron-
tenac and others.

But there is a pension.
There is, however, another feature to
the case. On his retirement from the
supreme court, Sir Charles will draw
a pension based on a term of judicial
service dating from 1906, and estimated
at about \$7,000 a year. The transfer
will, therefore, cost the public treasury
\$17,000 a year, instead of \$10,000 had
the appointment to the lieutenant-gov-
ernorship been made directly from
among the public men of Quebec.

Whether, in view of the present great
need for money, such pension will pass
unchallenged in the House, remains to
be seen. Still, Hon. C. J. Doherty, min-
ister of justice, is in practically the
same position. He draws his pay
\$7,000 as cabinet minister; \$2,500, repre-
senting pensional indemnity, and, in
addition, a judge's pension of about
\$3,000, or a total emolument of about
\$12,500.

Post for Mignault.
From authoritative sources it is
learned tonight that P. B. Mignault,
K.C., of Montreal, will be appointed to
the vacancy in the supreme court caused
by the retirement of Charles Fitz-
patrick and the promotion of Sir Louis
Davies. Hon. L. P. Pelletier, it is
stated, declined to accept the post.

Eugene LaFleur, K.C., of Montreal,
had many backers among the legal
fraternity for the position, but Mr.
LaFleur is a Protestant, and the position
is the prerogative of a Roman
Catholic.

The order-in-council appointing Mr.
Mignault will, it is said, be signed to-
morrow.

BOARD OF EDUCATION
IGNORES BAN PUT ON
ALL CIVIC MEETINGS

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 22.—Some interest-
ing developments are promised as the
result of a meeting held last night in
direct contravention to the orders of
the local board of health. The case
bids fair to be the more interesting in
view of the fact that the violators of
the law are the chairman and members
of the board of education.

The regular meeting night of the
board was Monday, October 14, but
owing to the epidemic of Spanish "flu,"
which caused all public meetings to be
cancelled on that day, the board pos-
sessed its gathering. Without notifying
the officials of the board of health or
anyone else, however, a meeting was
held last night, and while there was
only a sufficient number to form a quorum,
the complaint is not made because of
the meeting, but because it lasted
two whole hours, and even then the
business did not get into the matter
of any vital importance. The authori-
ties intend to take the matter up
at an early date, it was announced
tonight.

The regular monthly committee meet-
ing of the city council set for next
week will be called off, unless the ban
has been lifted, and the industrial cor-
poration, which is to have met last
night, postponed its weekly gathering
on account of the "flu." The only
maining body, the board of education,
met as usual.

The order of the board of health
distinctly states: "All public gatherings
shall be cancelled until further notice."

SPANISH "FLU" WELL UNDER CONTROL, IS ST. THOMAS' REPORT

Authorities State Disease Is
Broken, But Not Yet
Wholly Conquered.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 22.—Only two
deaths are reported in this city today
from the Spanish flu, and the authori-
ties believe the disease is now well

At first the epidemic was
confined almost entirely to the city,
and the more thickly populated sec-
tions of the outlying districts, it is
now reported to have spread to several
farms in the country, and in some cases
whole families are down with the dis-
ease, yet their homes are isolated from
anyone else by several miles. In view
of this fact one prominent local physi-
cian has stated that the disease is not
the air, and unless the human body is
in the best of condition anyone can be
stricken, even though isolated by many
miles from other sufferers.

TOOK HEALTH CENSUS.
CHATHAM, Oct. 22.—The local health
board this morning passed resolutions
to the effect that a census of the num-
ber of families in the city needing as-
sistance along nursing lines be taken
and that the physicians of the city be
assisted, as to whether the influenza
epidemic is increasing or on the de-
cline, and also regarding accepting the
assistance of any patriotic organiza-
tions in taking care of the sick.

This afternoon Mr. Cowan stated that
the unanimous report of all the physi-
cians in the city was to the effect that
there are no families in the city need-
ing assistance and that the disease was
on the decline.

John Frederick Appleby died at noon
today following a week's illness with
pneumonia. The deceased man was
born in Barrie 34 years ago, and moved
to Chatham about two years ago. He
only recently recovered from an attack
of typhoid fever. A wife and three
small children, his mother and three
sisters and four brothers survive.

at St. Joseph's hospital this morning,
where he was taken yesterday, follow-
ing an illness of eight days with pneu-
monia. He is survived by his father,
Newton Eberts, and one sister.

SIX WALLACEBURG VICTIMS.
CHATHAM, Oct. 22.—Pneumonia fol-
lowing in the wake of the Spanish flu,
has claimed six victims in Wallac-
eburg in the last few days. On Fri-
day J. Power was claimed as its victim,
and Saturday his 2-year-old daughter
followed him. Mrs. Garnet Campbell
passed away Saturday evening, a hus-
band and three small children to mourn
her death. Joseph McDougall, son of
Mr. and Mrs. James McDougall, of
Newton Hayes, son of Mr. and Mrs.
Wm. Hayes, died on Sunday.

laceburg, passed away at his home Mon-
day. He leaves a wife, who is very ill,
and one son, Pte. D. D. Berber, C.A.M.,
a medical student at Western Univer-

Seaforth.

ADMIT THOSE RECOVERED.
WOODSTOCK, Oct. 22.—No deaths
directly resulting from the influenza
epidemic are reported today in the city,
and the surrounding townships, today.
This fact, added to the statement of
local physicians that very few new cases
are reported today than usual, would
indicate that the crisis in Woodstock
was perhaps reached over the week-end.

The local board of health has passed
a resolution to the effect that the re-
quest of M. J. Brophy, superintendent
of the local business college, to reopen
the college to scholars who have had
the influenza and have fully recovered,
be granted. This measure has since
been criticized by citizens, who claim
it is not fair.

Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Francis received
word today of the death in New York
of their son Teddie, following an at-
tack of influenza. Teddie was but
17 years of age, and the fact that he
was ill was not known by his parents
until they were notified by telegram this
morning summoning them to his bed-
side. While preparing to start, a second
telegram, informing them of his death,
was received. His body will be brought
here for burial.

BAN WILL REMAIN.
KITCHENER, Oct. 22.—At a meet-
ing of the board of health here this
afternoon it was decided to take no
action on a petition for lifting the ban
on places of public assembly.

M. O. H. McGillivray stated that re-
ports from three physicians showed
fifteen more cases reported since yes-
terday. There were only three deaths
reported in the city today, the small-
est number since the epidemic became
prevalent. The board of health has
been Friday for the purpose of giving
further consideration to the question
of lifting the ban on places of public
assembly.

IMPROVING AT ST. THOMAS.
ST. THOMAS, Oct. 22.—Over 800
meals were served yesterday and to-
day at the cannery kitchen and dis-
tributed to the sick. Twelve volun-
teer nurses are on duty. Dr. J. A.
Robertson, M. O. H., stated today that
conditions were continuing to improve.
Doctors report receiving fewer calls,
and it would lead to the belief that the
epidemic was now on the downward grade.
Recent deaths—Grace Currie (in-
fant), George Downes, whose wife died
yesterday morning, and Cecil
Robertson.

PNEUMONIA HITS SEAFORTH.
SEAFORTH, Oct. 22.—In addition to
the three deaths from pneumonia re-
ported here yesterday, one was re-
ported today. Mrs. John Quill, wife of G. T. R.
Quill, died at her home today. She
leaves one little child, A. R. Quill,
feature of this case is the death of her

malady. The other death in Seaforth
was that of George Quill, who was
placed on the board of health as a
native of Seaforth, and a member of

NONE AT FLORENCE.

in the town of Florence, and every precau-
tion is being taken to prevent it. It
has been placed on gatherings by clos-
ing churches, schools and places of
amusement. Sunday was the first
churchless day for the town.
