PRODUCERS OF MILK RAISE THEIR PRICES TO 8 CENTS A QUART

It was decided unanimously to raise the price of milk to \$3.20 per cwt., which is 8 cents per quart, at a special meeting of the Middlesex Milk Producers' Association, held in the county council chambers on Saturday.
