

# ROBBED BANK

Police Wire Robbers' Description All Over the Country-

SECURED \$776 IN BILLS

The Locked Safe Contained \$2,000 and \$38,000 in Bonds.

No trace of the two bandits who robbed the South London branch of the Merchants Bank, 146 Wortley road, at the point of revolvers at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon had been found up to press time this morning, although description of the men was wired to every point within a radius of many miles a few minutes after the robbery had taken place.

The robbers secured a total of \$776, in bills of ten, five, two and one dollar denominations. Although there was considerable silver in the cash drawers along with the bills, none of it was taken. The safe, which was fortunately locked, contained, according to one of the officials, \$2,000 in cash and approximately \$38,000 in bonds, the majority of which were negotiable. The thieves were in too much of a hurry to tamper with the complicated door of the vault.

The police are confident that the two men made their escape in a five-passenger McLaughlin car owned by Roy Dale of this city.
