## SUBURBAN SERVICE IS

World's Campaign Finds Further Approval-Grand Trunk Blind to Possibilities of Traffic.

Mr. W. Glendon of the widely-known house, 286 Yonge-street, writes The World as follows:

"I wish to say that you are doing a most excellent work in taking up the agitation for a better suburban service. "Tor into's suburban service by railways and electric lines should be equal to that of cities on the American side The City of Rochester, for instance, which has not the population of Toron. to, has yet a most excellent service, reaching out both by rail and radial lines, as far as Syracuse.

'I notice that you make the state-

ment in your editorial this morning, that Hamilton should be included in this suburban service. This may seem a little rough on Hamilton, but from a practical point of view is sound com

mon sense. "Any person in writing to you on this subject will naturally be influence ed by his own immediate personal needs or inclinations. I myself am locating at Bronte, and have several friends who are thinking of doing like-

"Bronte is only 24 miles from Toronto, but is at present very poorly served by the Grand Trunk. To illustrate: Oakville has a commutation service whereby one is enabled to purchase a daily ticket at a cost of 13 cents a

daily ticket at a cost of 13 cents a trip. Yet to go to Bronte under the same conditions would cost 80 cents each way, this notwithstanding the fact that it is only four miles further. "Thus the people of Bronto and that portion of Halton County are put to this injustice and hardship, that they are required to pay full regular fare for transport over the Grand Trunk, while their neighbors at Oakville, only four miles distant, have the full benefit four miles distant, have the full benefit of most satisfactory and reasonable



When you hear that quick "rap, rap, rap, rap, rap, p," you will know that another rivet has been clinched and welded, another joint tightened in the frame of a building designed and dedicated to your service.
