EXPERT STENOGRAPHERS THE COMMON ARE AFTER BETTER RATE

Believe That Present Schedules Are Not Commensurate With the Work Done.

That salaries in Toronto, especially, and Ontario generally, have not kept pace with increased living expenses was once more confirmed at the meeting of the "Chartered Stenographic Reporters' Association of Ontario" yesterday at the parliament buildings. It was the annual convention, and as a result of the discussion the council was instructed to wait on the Ontario Government and request an increase in the retaining salary from \$1500 to \$2500 a year.

Thomas Bengough, the president, in his address, compared present rates with former scales, and with rates elsewhere, Ontario at present having a reduced tariff.

"Compare, for example," said Mr. Bengough, "the position of our high court reporters with that of men in analogous positions in the United States. This afternoon we shall welcome a number of our American conferers. Those who come from Philadelphia will tell you that the stenographic law which recently passed unanimously in the Legislature of Pennsylvania provides that the court reporters receive a retaining salary or \$2500, and in addition a fee of 15 cents per folio for transcript of every note of every case they report. In other words, they have a standing order in advance for the entire year's proceedings, which have to be filed with the clerk of the court. This of itself would forn a very handsome volume of business.
