ASK TERMS FOR 1000 H.P. FOR PURPOSES OF CITY

Not to Be Restricted to Buy Exclusively From Commission—Day's Happenings.

HAMILTON, June 18.—(Special.)—The civic power committee to-night instructed Mayor McLaren to apply to the hydro-electric commission for terms for 1000 horse-power for civic purposes, the city not to be bound to buy power exclusively from the commission. It was pointed out that Hamilton, not being a party to the agreement entered into between the commission and the group of municipalities, could get power on terms and conditions to be made by the commission. It was also decided to rush the work of the committee thru, and the solicitor and engineer of the commission will be invited to appear before the committee next Monday evening, or as soon as possible, to answer all questions that may be asked. The city engineer was also empowered to get the assistance of an electric expert to consult with him as to whether power could be used direct from the high transmission line.

A. H. ST. GERMAIN DIED IN N. TORONTO YESTERDAY

Was For Many Years in Newspaper Work—Odds and Ends of News From County.

NORTH TORONTO, June 18.—(Special.)—The death of A. H. St. Germain occurred at the family residence, Bedford Park shortly before 9 o'clock to-night, after an illness extending over some months. Mr. St. Germain was in his 81st year, having been born in Kingston in 1827, but the greater part of his life had been spent in Toronto. He was twice married, his first wife having died about fifteen years ago, and shortly after a second daughter. He leaves a widow.

At an early age he was apprenticed to the printing trade in association with a number of newspapers in an editorial and managerial capacity. Among others The Upper Canada Herald, Hamilton Times and Guelph Advertiser, and he later founded The Toronto Evening Journal, which had a career during the gold excitement in California he went west, and was successful, returning later to Toronto where he invested in real estate, and subsequently amassed a good deal of wealth. The "St. Germain" block on Bloor-street and another on Victoria-street, were erected by him. Later he has lived in comparative retirement on his farm at Bedford Park. Deceased was an adherent of the Baptist church and a Liberal. The funeral arrangements are not yet completed.

Big Meeting of Citizens Decide to Form Local Board of Trade.

WESTON, June 18.—(Special.)—The large and enthusiastic meeting of the business men of Weston and others was held in the council chambers to-night to consider the advisability of forming a board of trade. Major Wadsworth was in the chair and the whole matter was thoroughly discussed.

WOBRUN.

WOBRUN, June 18.—(Special.)—The Scarborough Township fathers held a regular field day in the council chamber for the annual court of revision, and the appeals were numerous and vigorous. No better evidence of the good work of the township assessors, Messrs. Green and Brown, could be furnished.

Thomas Thompson, who is the owner of two parcels of land on the Kingston-road, thru his solicitor and himself, made a strong appeal for a reduction in the assessment of each of the properties. One of these, 34 acres, is on the north side of the Kingston-road, and was valued by Assessor Green at nearly \$300 an acre. The other on the south side, containing 25 acres, was placed at \$400 an acre. On a total assessment of \$2000, Mr. Thompson gets a reduction of \$2000.

Incidentally it was shown that D. D. Mann on his 60 acre estate, is assessed on the whole property at an average of \$23.33 an acre.

Mr. Mann's property, 34 acres, is on the north side of the Kingston-road and is valued at \$284.00 and the 26 acres on the south side is placed at \$84.00 an acre. Mr. Mann made no appeal against the values placed upon it by the township valuator.

A number of other appellants made claims, but counsel were well impressed with the idea that the assessors had been fearless in the discharge of their duties, and changes were few and unimportant.
