STREET RY. STEAM PLANT DOESN'T REALIZE BOASTS

Instead of Developing 8000 H.P. It is Turning Out Less Than Half That Amount.

WENNEPEG, Nov. 26.—(Special).—The famine of power in the city, following the breakdown of the Street Railway Company's hydro-electric plant of La du Bonnet, has been so extreme as to arouse suspicions as to the capacity of the steam plant, which is being operated as a substitute, and which is claimed by the company to have a capacity of at least 8000 horsepower. No such amount of power is being developed, however, and it is believed that the operation of the street railway, and yet energy cannot be supplied for the operation of even the most necessary purposes of local industries, except when the lighting and car-systems are discontinued.

BUFFERIN CLUB MATINEE

Heater Schuyler, Joe Pointer and Violet the Winners.

There was a fair attendance at the matinee given yesterday under the auspices of the Dufferin Driving Club, which had been postponed from the previous Wednesday on account of the condition of the track. There were three races on the card, one a special for trotters, which was won in straight heats by Heater Schuyler. In the third heat Violet, who had not been better than third in the two previous heats, was making a strong bid for the title, but unfortunately the wheel of her sulky came off, which caused Mr. Marshall to pull up. It was fortunate there was no accident to the mare or the driver. The time was not fast, but the track was wet and heavy, which accounts for it. In Class B, Violet had an easy race, winning also in three straight heats, with Belmont Wilkes second. Class C had a good field. Angus Mack won the first heat and Joe Pointer the next three. Wiry Stanton and William C. were also contenders, but the Pointer horse seemed to have it on them.

Richard Expects to Land Fight.

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—Bearing a certified cheque for \$25,000, to be applied in a bid for the title of champion of the world, G. L. Rickard of Goldfield, Nev., walked thru town en route to Philadelphia for a conference with Jeffries. The man who engineered the Gans-Nelson combat, one of the affairs in fight history, is after the heavyweight contest and is enthusiastic over his prospects. "I am going to land that fight," said Rickard during his stop here, "if money and protection can secure it. If I get the fight the battle will be all probability be held in East Lake City, Ill. We have things arranged, I have the certified cheque in my possession for \$25,000 and a certified check to bid as high as \$100,000 for the fight."

Kling and Donlin for Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 26.—John Kling, the star catcher for the Chicago National League Club, and Mike Donlin, who secured the managerial position of the Philadelphia team and it is said that Mike Donlin will also come here as an outfielder. The deal was closed here this afternoon at a conference at which were present Mr. Murphy and State Senators James F. McKillop and Clarence Wolf and representatives of the estate of the late State Senator L. W. Durlan, who secured the controlling interest in the club last February. The terms of the sale were not announced, nor were the names of the members of the syndicate, although the name John T. Brush, owner of the New York Club, is mentioned as one of the new owners.

Disband E. C. H. L.

MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—At a meeting of hockey representatives, held last night, it was decided to disband the Eastern Canada Association and to form a new association, to be known as the Canadian Hockey Association, which will include the leading clubs in the old leagues. The meeting was private and was continued to a very late hour.
