GOING TO BRAZIL AS COMMISSIONER

Major McColl Leaving City Tonight to Become Government Representative.

Major Ernest Leonard McColl, who has recently been appointed Canadian trade commissioner for Brazil, is leaving tonight for New York, where he sails Saturday on the steamer Vancouver for Rio de Janeiro.

Major McColl is a graduate of Toronto University, and also took post-graduate work at London University. He has been in the Canadian Field Artillery as commander of the 8th Battery, he was in the army of occupation at Versailles when the peace treaty was signed.

There are excellent opportunities for increasing trade between Canada and Brazil, said Major McColl, especially in the C.G.M.M. and Houston lines giving direct services. There is already a lot of trade, but unfortunately it has mostly gone through New York agents.

TO CELEBRATE MASS FOR LATE LORD MAYOR

Arrangements Being Completed in Toronto Catholic Church—"Courage of a Martyr."

Arrangements are being completed for holding a mass for the repose of the soul of the late Lord Mayor MacSwiney, in the Holy Name Church, one day next week. It is officially stated that this is not being done at the request of the self-determination league, but of the inspiration of individual parishioners.

The pastor of the church, the Rev. Fr. Cline, in defending his action in saying the mass, said his parishioners looked upon the late lord mayor as representing the soul of young Ireland.

It was rumored yesterday that a high religious mass was to be said at St. Michael's Cathedral, but the Rev. Dr. McBride, the rector, said he had no knowledge of it and further declared that the holding of such a mass was a matter for the consideration of each individual priest.

STRUCK BY ENGINE MAN IS BADLY HURT

James Weir Crawls Under the Gates at Pape Avenue Crossing.

Struck by a light engine at the G.T.R. crossing at Pape avenue yesterday afternoon, James Weir, of Loyd-town, King township, living in the city at 113 Boston avenue, was seriously injured. He was taken to the St. Michael's hospital in the police ambulance. Weir is suffering from several fractured ribs and severe scalp wounds in addition to internal injuries. His condition is regarded as critical.

According to the police the gates were down at the crossing, but Weir crawled under them and commenced to make his way across the railway tracks. An engine and a long string of freight cars were proceeding west when the train and did not notice the eastbound light engine. Weir was thrown a distance of about 100 feet by the force of the impact. He was attended by Dr. Murray, 939 East Gerrard street, who had him removed to the hospital.

ALLEGED BOOTLEGGER ELECTRIC WORKERS' UNION JOIN WITH BUILDERS

That the Canadian National Union of Electrical Workers, of which James T. Gunn is the business manager, has practically affiliated with the Canadian Federation of Labor, was made manifest last night when the general secretary of the Canadian Federation announced to the World that the union had become affiliated with the National Building Trades Association, a body affiliated with and under the jurisdiction of the Canadian Federation of Labor.

This council comprises the Canadian Hoisting Engineers, 20 strong; the Canadian National Plumbers and Steamfitters, 125 strong; the Canadian Hoisting Engineers, 120 strong; and the Canadian Electrical Workers, 800 strong, totalling a membership of 1,135. The officers of the National Building Trades Association elected last night were: President, William J. MacDonald of the Canadian Hoisting Engineers; vice-president, H. R. Brown of the Canadian National Plumbers, and secretary, P. M. Brad of the National Electrical Workers.
