tion that in the disposal of their property they were not unmindful of the interests of that kingdom, the reality of which they now more fully comprehend.
Issues.-Your Committee have much pleasure in reporting that the issues during the past year have amounted to $2,400,776$ copies. It would not be right to draw any comparison between these figures and those of the preceding year; because, as has been explained in former reports, these statistics have not hitherto included the Vernacular Scriptures, printed and circulated at the expense of the Society, by the Auxiliaries in India. An attempt has, however, been made this year to obtain such returns as would render the account of the issues complete ; and although through somg mis-conception of the nature of the information required, this end has not yet been fully gained, the hope is entertained that before another anniversary your committee will be able to furnish an accurate account of the foreign as well as of the home circulation.

Deducting the imperfect returns of the Indian Auxiliaries, which have been given at about 109,000 , the foreign issues have amounted to 939,787 , which by a few hundreds esceed those of the preceding year. The home issues are a few thousands less-buc this is to be expected in a country where the good seed of God's Word has been sown for so many years, and with such a liberal hand.
The accompanying statemont furnishes the particulars of circulation :-


The total issues of the Society now amount to fif ry-five millions, sixty-ming ehousand, bight hundagd and sixty-fivg copirs.
