LATE LOCALS
Steamer Yarmouth, while coming in port from Digby last evening, broke her steering gear near Partridge Island, which delayed her some time.
Norwegian steamer Hird, Captain Jensen, arrived in port this morning from Parborough with 1,434 tons coal for Canadian Pacific Railway.
The repairs to the floats at the Eastern S. S. wharf are rapidly being completed and the structure will soon be in better condition than for many years past.
The rooms on the ground floor and basement of City Hall are being wired for electric lighting. The work is being done by Frank E. Jones.

St. James church, Broad street, which is being fitted with electric lighting, will probably be in readiness for the current to be turned on Sunday next. The new fixtures add greatly to the appearance of the sacred edifice.
In Salvation Army Citadel tonight there will be special demonstration under the direction of Mrs. Adj. Carter and the Sunday school children; subject of the same will be, "The Building of a Salvation Army Corps."

St. John District L. O. L. officers will visit York L. O. L., No. 3, this evening in their hall, German street. An interesting programme has been prepared. All members of the order are invited to be present.
L. G. Calder, sheriff of Saskatoon, arrived here yesterday and is a guest at the Royal. He is one of the pioneers of Saskatchewan, and regards Manitoba and the Northwest as excellent fields for enterprising and energetic young men.

In a few days skating will be over for this season. But so far the ice at the Glacier Rink has kept in fine condition, and could not be better than it is today. THE FISH MARKET
The Lenten demand for fresh fish is steadily increasing as the season advances and it is satisfactory to note that the supply for tomorrow's trade will be better in many respects than for several weeks. Good catches of halibut are being made in the bay and some nice new stock is being offered for sale. A quantity of Bay of Fundy cod has also been received, and from the present indications it seems safe to conclude that before long there will be a marked decrease in importation of fresh fish from the American market.
Retail prices rule as follows:—Cod, 6c a pound; haddock, 6c; new native halibut, 8c; gasparant, 6c; pickerel, 9c; a pound; flounders, 8c; smelts, 10c, and cod stead, 10c; haddies, 9c; blotters, 24c; a dozen; kipper, 26c; smoked salmon, 25c; oysters, 75c; a quart; clams, 20c, and scallops, 60c.

The lucky man is Cliff Dalling, and on Monday he joined the noble army of benedicts. Mrs. Dalling, who was formerly Miss J. M. Fortier, of McAdam (N. NOW HE'S SORRY HE SIGNED IT
R. B. Douglas Signed Agreement to Sell Land Worth \$2,000 to City for \$300--Lawsuit Follows.

The case of the City of St. John vs. R. Bruce Douglas, came up in the equity court this morning. Recorder Skinner appearing for the plaintiff and M. G. Teed and Homer D. Forbes for the defence.
In this case the city is taking action against Mr. Douglas to compel the performance of a specific agreement, claiming that the defendant had signed an agreement to accept \$300 for his portion of the land at Loch Lomond which the city had expropriated in the extension of the water works system.
Mr. Douglas in answer to this statement claims that he did sign an agreement as already mentioned, but was not in proper condition to do so, and going to the city authorities demanded the return of the document which was refused. He also maintains that the land referred to was worth much more than \$300, and now wants \$2,000 for it. The case will be resumed at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

THE RIVER OPENING
This Year It Will Probably be Two Weeks Earlier Than Last Season.

It is now believed that navigation on the river will be at least two weeks earlier than last year, when the first boat made a start on the 29th of April, going as far as Georgetown. The run to Fredericton was accomplished on the 29th. This season it is believed at Indianhook, from information received from points along the river, that a start will be made about the 10th of April, and that the river will be clear to Fredericton somewhere in the vicinity of that date.
