

England, &c. SUMMARY.

A public meeting has been held at the Market House in Taunton, (England) for the purpose of forming an association in connection with the Newfoundland and British North American School Society, where resolutions and subscriptions were entered into for that effect. The report states, that the poor among the abolitionists are labouring under the deprivation of Christian instruction, and that 25,000 persons had emigrated from Ireland alone to British North America during the last year.

LAND TO COTTAGERS.—ANTI-EMIGRATION.

It is well known to every one, that a projected system of locating a certain number of individuals, with their families, in Canada, in New South Wales, the Swan River, Van Diemen's Land, &c. has been once more under discussion in the House of Commons. Without entering into the details of this plan, which are matter of notoriety, we may be permitted to ask, if it has hitherto been sufficiently considered, whether the individuals, whom we are now transplanting abroad, may not be better provided for at home. Emigration is not a bad resource; it is, to say the least of it, unproductive, and does violence to those natural feelings, and that instinctive love of country, which ought to be wrapped into the composition of every Englishman.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.—March 8. A Message from His Majesty's Council.—Mr. Bliss, Master of the Council, informed the House that the Council had agreed to the following Bills: A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the ordinary services of the Province. A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province. A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned.
