## LUMBER MILLS TO CUT 120,000,000 FEET

Amherst Man Tells of Big Mills and Big Farms Operated by New Brunswick Firm

(Amherst Guardian)  
The following interesting reference to farming and lumbering operations near Plaster Rock, New Brunswick, were written for The Guardian by John C. Reeves, who recently returned to Amherst after a trip to Plaster Rock in the interests of the Rhodes-Curry Company. I spent a week lately at Plaster Rock on the Tobique, Victoria county, N.B. The village has about 700 of a population, having four churches, post office and schools and several stores. The whole village is practically dependent upon the large saw mill of the Fraser Lumber Company which is located there. A branch of the C. P. R. runs in from Perth, 28 miles away, with a daily train. The National Transcontinental also touches Plaster Rock.

**Eleven Mills Busy**  
The Fraser have 11 mills in all, cutting about 120,000,000 feet this season. The mill at Plaster Rock this year will cut 16,000,000 feet, the average daily cut being 160,000 feet, besides shingles and laths. The whole cut at Plaster Rock goes on the C. P. R. to the United States.

In connection with the mill, they have a 300 acre farm all in a high state of cultivation. The man in charge told me that they had put 800 large loads of hay in the barns. They were cutting grain with a reaper and binder, the crop being very heavy. On this farm he keeps 36 milch cows. He supplies the village with milk, night and morning. He has a special barn for his cows and also has a pigery in which there were 83 pigs varying in size from very small to very large. They have 86 horses, mostly Clydes, weighing from 1400 to 1700 pounds each. These are mostly used in the mill yard.

They have another farm at North View, about four miles out. Mr. Fraser

took me out to see what he called his "potato patch." The farm in large and sloping gradually towards the river. We found the men spraying Bordeaux mixture for the last time to prevent blight. In one square field were 40 acres of potatoes as green as in June. He pulled up one hill having five shipping potatoes in it, at which rate they would average about 200 bushels per acre, all of the Green Mountain variety. They have a special potato cellar which holds 4,000 bushels.

The potatoes are planted with a seed, the rows 32 inches apart and about 14 inches in the row. They are cultivated every few days and generally sprayed for bugs and blight five or six times, all by machinery. Commercial fertilizer was used, wholly. Owing to the war, the fertilizer was not so good this year, as it lacked potash, consequently the crop will not be as large as last year, the crop being good last year and the price high. Mr. Fraser told me he realized in the vicinity of \$10,000 from the same acreage.

The land in that section and along the Tobique river, I think, produces the largest crops of grass and grain I ever saw in this country and when the Transcontinental Railway gets fully under way it will be a great farming country. The road is already averaging about 10 trains daily.

## Canadians Had Share in Victory

Meagre bulletins received at Ottawa regarding the part taken by the Canadian divisions in the big allied gains of the last three days on the Somme front merely state that the Canadians held a conspicuous share in the taking of the ground won and that the casualties are not as heavy as might have been expected considering the ground gained and the impetuous character of the Canadian attack. From what is known of the position in the British line held by the men from Canada, there is no doubt but that the "capture of Mont St. Eloi" and of the Danube Trench," as mentioned in Sir Douglas Haig's despatches, must be due to the efforts of the Canadians.

The British official statement issued last night says that the British line has been advanced 1,000 yards along a one-mile front. A powerfully fortified German work was captured. To the south of Comblès the French have taken additional trenches, making stronger their investment of the little town.

Franco-Serbian troops have surrounded the Bulgarian forces in northwestern Macedonia, which are falling back precipitately on Monastir, according to reports received in Athens.

A French statement says that French troops have carried by assault the important town of Florina in Macedonia.

## THE TURN OF THE TIDE

One of the most remarkable recoveries from depression to prosperity recorded as a result of the war is that in the status of the International Paper Company. In 1907 the company was saved from receivership by the entrance of banking interests with a loan to carry the company over. The preferred stock sold at 40-1-2 a few months ago. Today the International management has wiped out all of the floating debt, and its preferred stock is selling in the 90's. The recent advance has been due to an expectation, which is not discouraged by members of the board, that the company is not only in a position now to pay the

regular 6 per cent. dividend, but to begin the liquidation of accumulated dividends, amounting to about 80 per cent.

## PLAYGROUNDS EXECUTIVE PREPARE FOR WINTER WORK.

A special meeting of the executive of the Playgrounds Association was held last evening with Rev. W. G. Lane in the chair. Commissioner Fisher was also present and participated in the discussion. The question of finances for the period until May next was referred to a special committee, of which the president, W. B. Tennant, is chairman, the other members being the treasurer, secretary, and Miss Leavitt and R. J. E. Armstrong were appointed a committee to consider the method of carrying on the work of the Boys' Club; and the ladies' committee, of which Mrs. H. Colby Smith is convenor, was instructed

to confer with Miss Pitt and Miss Hefner concerning the Girls' Club and its work for the fall and winter. Mrs. William C. Good was added to the executive.

## GERMANY SAVES OLD PAPER

With typical thoroughness old unused paper has been collected in Germany since the blockade of the Allies, became effective enough to be felt. In Berlin alone there are nearly 500 receiving offices where supplies of used paper are collected. The total number of receiving offices in Prussia is about 2,000. School children are the best collectors and contribute vast amounts of old paper to the depositories. The paper is sorted and sent to the mills, where it is reduced to pulp and used again. Iron rings are offered as rewards for large contributions. In this and other ways the public interest is stimulated.

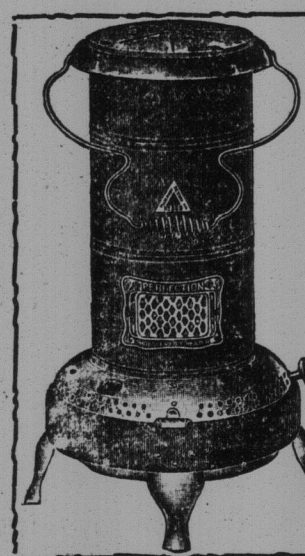
