GERMANY DOWN TO LOOSE CHANGE

Reserve Capital of Men Has Been Spent

HILAIRE BELLOC'S VIEWS

Figures German-Austro Losses At 5,000,000 Men — Reserves Now Small and Composed of Poorer Fighters

According to the New York American, Hilaire Belloc is the foremost military writer in Europe. Since he is an Englishman, and has from the beginning predicted the triumph of the Allies, it may be assumed that the New York American, who is a pro-German, did not bestow this title upon him without due cause, however dangerous it is for any man or any paper to say that any man or anything else is the greatest in the world. However, since Mr. Belloc is a writer for the Allies, and the New York American pays him money for his articles, he must be admitted to be an authority of unusual note. Apart altogether from his communications to the Hearst paper, it is admitted that Mr. Belloc has been justified month by month since the war began in his estimate of the general situation.

The Capital Spent

The article to which particular reference is made was written in the face of statistics available up to Sept. 1. What has happened since then has served only to prove that Mr. Belloc's calculations were correct. Mr. Belloc was of opinion that a month ago the Teutons were in sight of their last resources, that they had exhausted their original capital, 12,000,000 soldiers, and had not more than 2,000,000 to draw upon.

His estimate respecting Germany and Austria, that up to the beginning of the month they had lost more than 1,000,000 men in killed, wounded, prisoners and sick, including losses permanent and temporary. He estimates that of these losses three-fourths are permanent, the other fourth representing ill and wounded men who are patched up and enabled to return to the front. Nevertheless, he says that five and a quarter million of men who have borne arms for Germany and Austria since the war began will never bear arms again. For the purposes of the war they are worse than dead.

Germany's Armies Today

In an endeavor to determine what these losses mean to the present moment, the writer calculates that upon the western front the Germans have never fewer than 1,000,000 men. He estimates that in the past few months this force has been increased and was upon Sept. 1 only 1,200,000, if not 2,000,000. That the enemy has been strengthening upon the west is plain, for he calculated that at certain points his line was too thin, and he has sought to strengthen it by throwing the wall which the Allies broke through a few days ago. In the first fighting line against the Russians the Germans and Austrians have had 2,500,000 men, figures that will enable us to grasp the tremendous task that has been laid upon the Russians, who for the time being have been outnumbered as decisively as the French and British a year ago, apart altogether from the German advantage in munitions.

Five Million Soldiers

Opposed to the Italians Mr. Belloc calculates that there are a quarter of a million Austrians. This is a small army with which to oppose first-class power like Italy, and though Mr. Belloc does not say so, it means that Italy has an army of two for every other soldier than upon Trieste and the Trentino. Maybe the Italian army is ready to assist that Serbia against Bulgaria. Maybe it is prepared to land upon the Gallipoli and assist in the downfall of the Turks.

In any event, while Austria has only a quarter of a million men against Italy, Italy can match her enemy and keep in reserve two or three other armies of equal size to hurl at other points against the Teutons. Mr. Belloc says the figures he gives are the very minimum, and he asserts that at the present time Germany and Austria have more than 5,000,000 men in the firing line, including those who are growling over the Serbian frontier.

Down to the Loose Change

Originally Germany and Austria had 12,000,000 men who could become soldiers. Five million of them have been killed or wounded or put out of business through other means. Five million and more are now guarding the various frontiers. That means that not more than 2,000,000 men are in reserve. He points out, too, that the last million or two are not such good soldiers as the first couple of million. Germany and Austria will never have again such troops as they had a year ago or six months ago. He likens the last reserve of an army to pouring treacle out of a jug, and he reviews military history to show that when a nation gets down to the last of her men she has already lost. The auxiliaries increase alarmingly, and that, he says, was the position of Germany a month ago. She had hundreds of thousands to draw upon. She had not millions. Her millions have been spent. Her bills have gone. She is down to her loose change, and she is opposing an enemy who has still the banknotes to pay upon the table.

TRAGEDY IN CAFE

Somerville Girl Shot by Man, Who Then Ends His Own Life

Chicago, Oct. 1.—Double death followed a lover's quarrel in a cafe in Clark street. A man shot a woman who refused his plea for reconciliation, then shot himself. Mrs. May Whitney, the mother of a three-year-old boy, was one victim. She had been living in an apartment at Erie and St. Clair streets. Her parents live in Piquette street, Southside.

Washington Irving Morley, son of P. Morley, a wealthy contractor in Kansas City, with offices in the Sherby Building there, killed her and himself. He was a partner in the express firm of Ryan & Morley. A week ago he withdrew from the firm.

Mrs. Whitney was employed as piano player in Philip Spangenberg's cafe, in North Clark street. Morley was in financial difficulties, and, according to his story to her, the police were looking for him for passing worthless checks. This caused the quarrel between the two.

Her refusal to overlook his transgressions caused him to plan the double shooting. It was indicated by letters found in his pocket. He found her in the cafe at noon. She saved his anger, went to his table and had lunch with him. They conversed at length. Finally they arose. She mentioned to Mrs. Spangenberg that Morley was going out of town.

As they were leaving the room he jerked a revolver from his pocket and shot Mrs. Whitney in the head. He then put a bullet in his own brain and died instantly. She died on the way to a hospital.

In his clothing were found two letters, one addressed to "Anybody," and the other to his father in Kansas City.

In the first of the letters he made made in his life, describing the woman whom he killed as being "ten times times worse than the vampire of fiction," warning young men to beware of evil women, and concluding: "I am a man, and I am a creature who must have had women in all this misfortune. I cannot live with her and I cannot live without her."

PROPERTY TAX FOR PATRIOTIC FUNDS

Montreal, Oct. 1.—A by-law to authorize the raising of funds for patriotic purposes by a tax on property owners of the city was presented by Ald. McLagan, chairman of the Finance Committee, at the meeting of the Westminster, Montreal and other such well known producers, in all desired loads and calibres.

The by-law authorizes the levying of a tax of one-half mill on the dollar of all the taxable real estate in the city limits, and by this tax it is expected that over twenty thousand dollars will be realized. This money, it is stated, is to be put to patriotic purposes, for the Canadian Patriotic Fund, for hospital beds in France, and other worthy objects.
