BURIED WITH MILITARY HONORS

Comrades and Citizens Pay Tribute of Sympathy to Soldier Whe Died on Sunday - Impressive Service in St. David's Church

HAS NOT HEARD FROM SON IN FOUR MONTHS

Sister Lives in St. John-Formerly Was Mrs. Medley Priddle of City
Nurse in St. Stephen Road Anxious For News of

The sad news of the death of Mrs. Leonard J. Hughes, in Toronto, this morning, has been received by relatives in St. John. Mrs. Hughes, who before her marriage was Miss Grace A. Garnett, was for several years a nurse in the St. Stephen Memorial Hospital. Both she and her husband were well known in St. John before their removal to upper Canada and many friends are here.

Mrs. Hughes is survived by her husband, manager for Business Systems, Ltd., Toronto, one young son and an infant daughter, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Garnett of Prelate, Sask., one sister, Mrs. J. S. Gibbon of St. John, and two brothers, George of Silver Falls and Winfred of Prelate. The body will be brought to St. John for interment, and the funeral, of which notice will be given later, will take place probably on Saturday afternoon.

Hayward

The mysterious disappearance of her son, from whom she has had no word for four months, is causing deep anxiety to Mrs. Medley Priddle of 73 City road.

Her son, Hayward Priddle, aged eighteen years, left the city in the spring with a companion, Arthur Totten, and was in Montreal for a time. Then the boys made a trip on a horse boat to England and returned to Montreal. From Montreal, young Priddle and told the latter's mother that he was coming home. His companion, Totten, arrived in the city without Priddle and told the latter's mother that he was following on the next train.

The boy did not arrive, but it was some time later before the mother began to worry about him, and by that time his young companion had gone off with the 55th Battalion, and she was unable to secure more information from him. Previous to his disappearance, the
