## BOY, 11, DROWNS IN MIRAMICHI

William White Slips Off  
Wharf Into Water; Second  
Mishap in 3 Days

CHATHAM, July 7.—William White, age 11, was drowned in the Miramichi River off the town wharf here about 8 o'clock this evening. Young White was standing on a ledge at the face of the wharf when he slipped and fell into the water. He was unable to swim and he disappeared from sight. His companions rushed for aid and grasping parties were organized. At a late hour tonight the body had not been recovered. The unfortunate youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry White, of Kerr Farm, a young brother and a sister also survive.

On Monday evening John Fenelon, 14, son of William Fenelon, was drowned off a catamaran at Newcastle, within sight of his companions on shore. Reports yesterday were to the effect that his body had not been recovered.

### LEAVES DRY DOCK

The steamship Empress of Montreal, Capt. Simpson, which has been in port since Feb. 22 last, hauled out from the plant of the Saint John Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co. yesterday and went outside Partridge Island to adjust her compass. The steamer, which has been undergoing repairs, has been chartered to take on a lumber cargo at Salmon River, N. S., and will begin loading there in a few days. She cleared for port yesterday afternoon. The vessel's tonnage is 1,285.

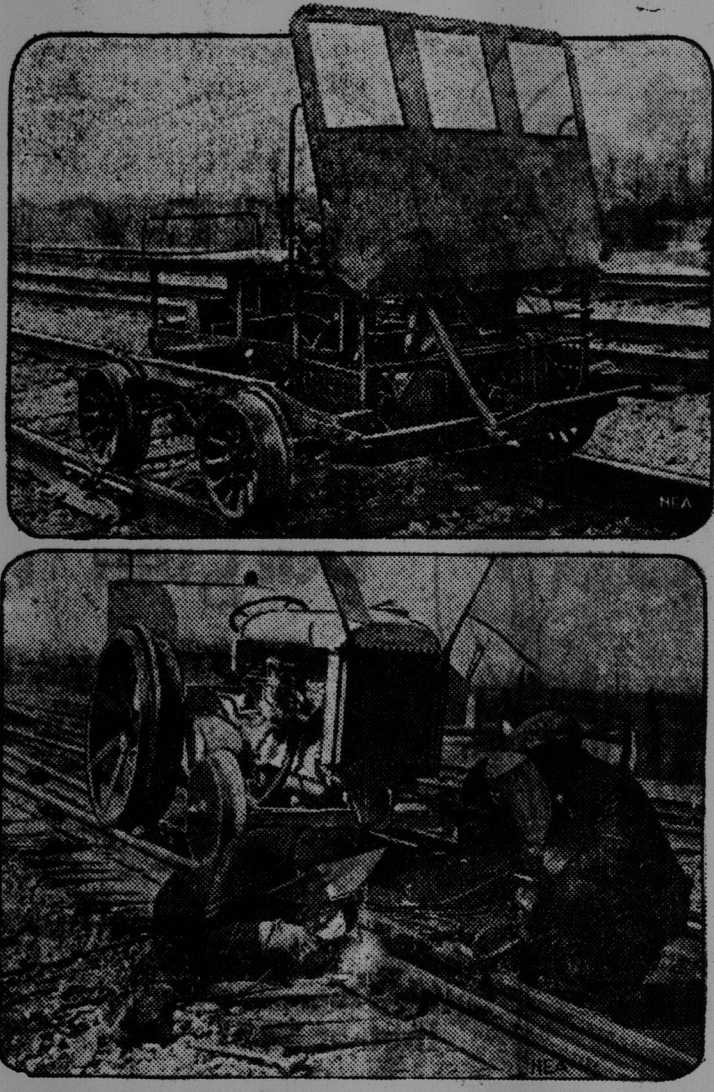

## FLIVVERIZING A RAILROAD




Yarmouth Minister Invited to be

## ORPHANAGE FUND INCREASED \$2,000

Deficit Stands at \$27,000, is  
Report at Meeting of  
Directors

The board of directors of the New Brunswick Orphanage at its meeting yesterday afternoon learned that the public response to the recent drive for funds to wipe out the deficit in the maintenance account had reached \$2,000. It was reported that the finances were in a very grave state and the deficit stood at \$27,000. D. C. Clark, the president, was in the chair and the meeting was largely attended. Reports of the administration of the orphanage were very satisfactory and the children were said to be in excellent health. The director endeavored to secure the services of a clergyman to act as financial agent for the orphanage but it was stated last evening that up to that time no success had attended this endeavor.

## CONCRETE DAM WILL BE BUILT AT MUSQUASH

New Structure, Costing \$30,000, to Replace Wooden  
Loch Alva Structure

REPLACEMENT of the present wooden dam at Loch Alva at the Musquash hydro-electric development by a concrete dam, estimated to cost between \$30,000 and \$35,000, has been decided on by the Provincial Government. Premier John B. M. Baxter announced here last evening.

The recommendation for this reconstruction work came from the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, whose members recently made a tour of inspection of the Musquash plant. The commission report, Premier Baxter said, contained a finding that the Loch Alva dam, which holds back a reservoir of one and one-quarter billion cubic feet of water, is gradually decaying as shown by the fact that the wood is alternately wet and dry. This dam is on the east branch and was erected in 1921.

**FRESHETS CAUSE BREAK.**  
Last spring, freshets caused a break of considerable magnitude, Premier Baxter said, and at one time the main surface water main and the power plant were in danger. Through prompt action, temporary repairs were made. If left unrepaired, however, it would be certain to produce damaging results. It was therefore the unanimous decision of the commission to erect a new concrete dam.

The premier said that had the Musquash system been providing the 2 per cent. maintenance fund set up as an operating charge, there would have been in the fund more than sufficient money to take care of this very contingency. As it is, this extra cost will be a charge on capital account. It is easy to picture, he said, what would happen the equipment down river if the Loch Alva dam were suddenly destroyed, precipitating the contents of Loch Alva to a depth of 15 feet on the head pond immediately below.

## HIT BY AUTOMOBILE

James Watson is Injured by Car  
Driven by John Sutherland

A runaway car, No. 8129, owned and driven by John Sutherland, of 55 Pitt street, struck and slightly injured James Watson in North Market street, near Charlotte street, at 8:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon and ran onto the sidewalk alongside the Market building, narrowly missing a second man. Just as Sutherland turned from Charlotte street into North Market street Watson, who is about 67 years of age, stepped from the sidewalk on the northern side of North Market street and was struck before the car could be halted. Watson was stunned and was assisted by Paul Quinn, local barrister, Police Sergeant McLeese and others. The injured man was driven to the General Public Hospital in Mr. Quinn's car. An examination showed that Watson had been bruised slightly but had not suffered any serious injury apparently. He will be kept at the hospital a few days. In answering to avoid running over Watson, Sutherland ran onto the opposite sidewalk, but controlled his car in time to prevent damaging it against the Market building.

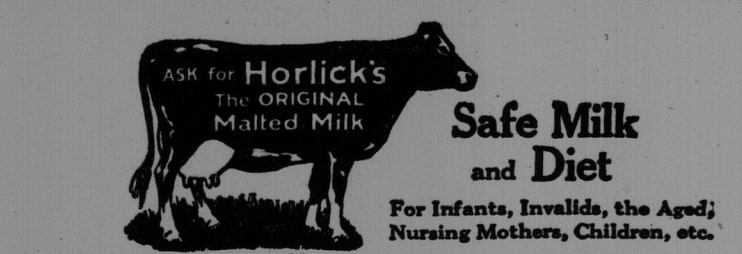




