DEDICATION OF SAINT JOSEPH'S

Fine New Church Property
on Loch Lomond Road—
Ceremony and Picnic on Monday.

The new St. Joseph's Catholic church at Loch Lomond will be dedicated on Monday morning at 10 o'clock by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc. The new edifice is a frame building, twenty-six by forty-six feet and has seating capacity for about 100 people. It is Gothic in architecture and is a fine example of the small suburban church. The beautiful altar, which is also Gothic, is painted in white and gold. Chairs will be used for seating the congregation for the present; pews will be installed later.

A new parochial house has been erected near the church and is a large and well constructed parish residence, painted white. A community hall has also been erected. The buildings are situated on beautiful grounds facing Broadview Lane, about one mile from the Ben Lomond House and about three and one-half miles from Johnston's Hotel. It is within a stone's throw of a large summer camping district.

The bishop will bless the new structure at 10 o'clock, after which the pastor, Rev. H. A. Coughlin, will celebrate mass, assisted by visiting priests. Rev. C. P. Carleton of Silver Falls will preach the dedication sermon.

The dedication of the church grounds will be held at 2 o'clock. A bus service has been arranged to leave the Y. M. C. I. in Cliff street at 9 o'clock. The service will be held at the church at 10 o'clock. The bishop will bless the new structure at 10 o'clock, after which the pastor, Rev. H. A. Coughlin, will celebrate mass, assisted by visiting priests. Rev. C. P. Carleton of Silver Falls will preach the dedication sermon.

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PLANE HURTS 6 IN CHICAGO.
Runs "Amuck" in Starting After Alighting in Grant Park.

Chicago, June 2.—An airplane "ran amuck" in Grant Park on the ground, injuring six people. One man's arm was torn off by the propeller. The plane, which bore the name of Thomas E. Wilson, in large letters on each side, had been flying above Michigan Boulevard all afternoon during the Memorial Day parade. It landed in Grant Park, and was taking off when the accident occurred.

The police learned that the pilot's name was G. J. McGee, and that the plane came in from the Kokomo, Ind., field. A newspaper reporter, Steve O'Connor, was with the pilot at the time, the police were informed, but neither were located after the accident.

Spectators said the plane was apparently carrying some advertising device, but none was seen on it after the accident.

Christian Church And Physical Standards

Must Place Larger Emphasis on Bodily Fitness—A Tentative Programme.
Portschach, Austria, June 2.—The Christian Church throughout the world must place larger emphasis on the relationship of physical fitness to moral and spiritual growth; it cannot permit physical standards and forms of amusement and recreation to be determined by organizations holding lower standards of living.

This declaration is one of many features of a report presented today to the 900 delegates composing the Second World's Conference of Y.M.C.A. Workers with Boys by Dr. John Brown Jr., of New York, as chairman of an international commission on the physical condition of boys.

The present physical condition of boys throughout the world, said the report, "and of conditions affecting the physical life of boys, constitute an imperative demand that the forces of Christianity and civilization shall be rallied to create a new attitude toward all questions having a direct bearing upon boyhood."

Among the conditions which the report emphasized were that diseases causing the greatest number of deaths among adolescents are largely preventable diseases; that there is a definite relation between mental retardation and scholastic standing, and the occurrence of preventable diseases and physical defects, and that much of the best influences of the home, Church and school are undermined and counteracted by harmful influences of the leisure hours of adolescents.

A tentative minimum program of physical education, proposed by the commission for the consideration of the conference included the following:

1. A department of the government should give particular study to conditions affecting physical fitness of boys from 12 to 18 years of age.
2. Schools should recognize their peculiar responsibility for safe-guarding and raising the standards of physical fitness of boyhood.
3. Communities should provide play spaces properly supervised for free use of boys.
4. A special responsibility rests upon the Church to create a spiritual attitude and conception on the part of boys toward life in all its relations.

There is need for an organization that shall bring together and unite the various governmental and inter-governmental agencies directly or indirectly interested in the play and recreation of the youth.
