EXPORT TRADE OF CANADA INCREASES

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Ottawa, July 18.—Canada's export trade is going ahead. Domestic merchandise exported last month totalled \$71,760,336, as compared with \$69,148,171 in May, and \$88,076,299 in June of last year.

Imports entered for consumption

compared with previous month show a decrease. Last month imports were \$61,687,229; in May, \$66,121,374; in June, 1921, \$57,648,658.

The grand total of Canadian trade

was \$134,776,784 in June this year; \$139,280,004 in May, and \$117,346,117 in June last year.
