

Finds One Size Auto Truck Better Than Two.

In endeavoring to operate a retail establishment's delivery service with as maximum of economy as well as efficiency, the "flexibility" of the system is, of course, an important factor to be borne in mind. That this matter of flex ibility is to a large degree dependent on the size of the equipment used is the opinion, based on experience, of A. A. Franklin, delivery superintendent of John Wanamaker's New York store.

Until a year ago the Wanamaker firm was using two sizes of trucks for its local deliveries. Thousand-pound wagons were employed for the firm's parcel delivery, and two-ton trucks were used for handling bulky articles. Last winter, however, a change was inaugurated in the store's delivery methods which has brought such favorable results in the way of greater economy and increased operating efficiency that it is worthy of the consideration of other merchants whose delivery system may be handicapped by the fact that its component parts are not of the right size.

What Wanamaker's did was to remove both the two-ton and the 1,000-pound trucks from this branch of its service and use in their place 1,500-pound machines, which combined the work of the other two models.

Superintendent Franklin waxes enthusiastic in discussing the results of bils change.
