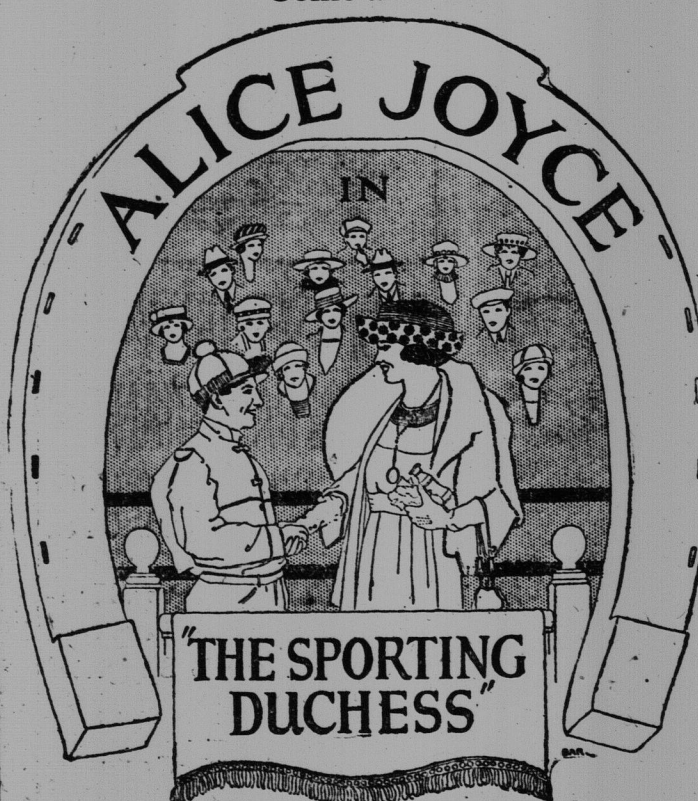

College Competition.

Madison, Wis., April 5.—University of Chicago gymnasts defeated Wisconsin Saturday 193.75 points to 174.75. Tasche of Wisconsin, with 35.625 points, was high individual scorer.

The Olympic Marathon.

Antwerp, April 5.—The course for the Olympic marathon race, the principal individual event of the Olympic games, has been officially selected and promises an excellent test for the long distance runners of the world.

The start of the race, provisionally set for August 21 or 23, will be made from the Royal Palace at Laeken, just outside of Brussels, and the finish will be made in the Olympic stadium at Antwerp. The distance will be 26.36 miles, including the final laps over the stadium track proper.

Leaving Laeken, the runners will follow a little used road from the palace for a kilometre, making a detour which will bring them to the main highway between Brussels and Antwerp. This road is almost as level as a table and leads through five or six small villages. There is but one hill of not more than ten per cent grade near Malines and this is the only obstacle which the competitors will have to surmount during the race. All traffic will be stopped during the race and the course will be well guarded.

New York, April 5.—Late reports from Belgium indicate that the Olympic games eligibility rules, always strictly enforced in past Olympiads, will be observed to the letter. The slightest flaw in the status of an athlete is sufficient to bar him from the games, according to a statement made by F. W. Rubien, secretary of the American Olympic committee.

The rules are:—
"Only amateur athletes to be admitted to the Olympic games."
"It is necessary to be a native of any given country or an naturalized citizen of same, or of the sovereign power to which said nation forms a part."

"Whoever has taken part in the Olympic games as a citizen of any given nation cannot be admitted in any future Olympiad as a candidate for any other nation even if he has been naturalized in that country, save and excepting cases of conquest or the creation of fresh states, duly ratified by treaty."

"In case of naturalization, the naturalized subject must supply adequate proofs that he was an amateur in his

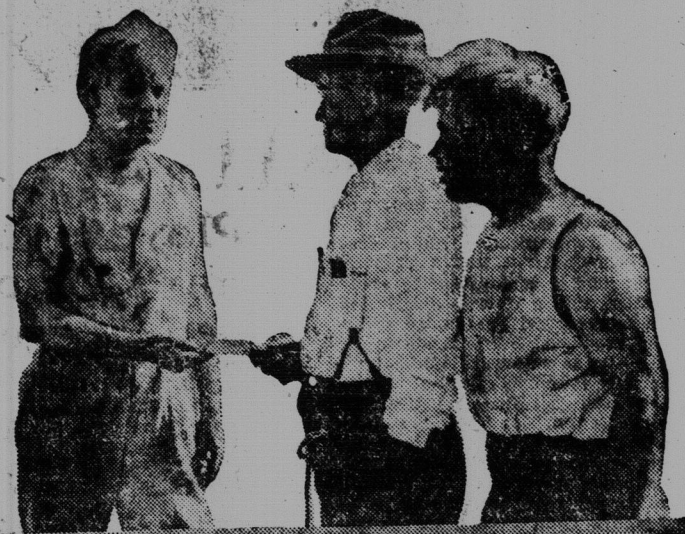

Jack Johnson to Box.
Mexico, Lower California, April 6.—Fred Dato, brother-in-law of Governor Estaban Cantu, announced today that Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion, now here, had signed with a syndicate represented by Dato to put on a finish fight here within sixty days.

Dato will try to get either Fred Fulton or Carl Morris to box Johnson.

New York, April 5.—An offer to post a bet of \$1,000 that Benny Leonard, lightweight champion of the world, cannot knock out or even knock down Geo. Pappin, champion of France, in a twenty-round bout, was made here today by Francis Descomps, his manager.

He also offered to post \$5,000 for a bout over any distance, any time, any place, between Pete Herman, world bantam champion, and Charley Ledoux, champion of France.

Pappin and Ledoux, stable mates of Georges Carpentier, are to sail from Le Havre on April 17, and will arrive here about April 27.

Boston Tournament.
Boston, April 5.—Amateur boxers from many cities in Canada and the United States were here today for the national championship tournament to begin tonight under the auspices of the Boston A. A. With 122 contestants for the eight titles, the first night will be given over to elimination bouts. The semifinals and finals will be fought tomorrow night.

Champions of several colleges and of the metropolitan, Allegheny, South Atlantic, Central California and western districts of the American Amateur Athletic Union, are among the entrants, together with several national champions. In the 135 pound class, the winners of the event for the last three years are entered. They are Tommy Murphy of California, Thomas O'Malley, University of Pennsylvania, 1918, and Frank Cassidy, New York, 1919.
