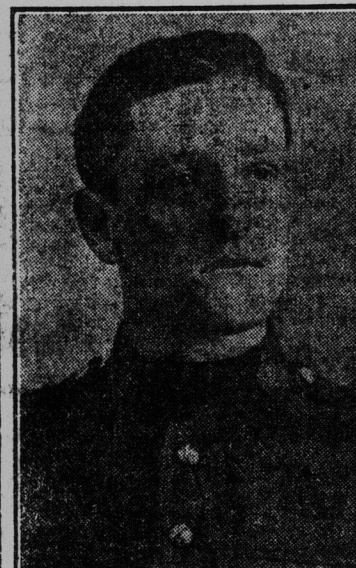

SPENT NIGHT IN CELL, DIED THE NEXT DAY

A series of tragic circumstances pre-
ceded the death of George Hartley Kim-
ball, an employee of the Standard, which
occurred on Thursday night. Several
weeks ago Kimball was taken to the
hospital suffering from a self-inflicted
wound in the neck. He was discharged
from the hospital on Tuesday but found
it necessary to return on Wednesday
morning to have the wound dressed
again. Leaving the hospital, he pro-
ceeded to the police station to secure the
keys of his trunk. Here he was detain-
ed until the ordinary business of the
court was completed and then was taken
before the magistrate on the charge of
attempting to take his own life. When
he was remanded to jail, Kimball asked
that a doctor be summoned as he was
not in condition to stand confinement in
the cells. A telephone message was left
for Dr. Bishop, which the doctor has
said he did not receive. On Thursday
morning Dr. G. O. Baxter was sum-
moned and, after examining the prisoner, he
certified that the jail was no place for
him. Kimball was released on Thurs-
day afternoon and returned to the home
of his brother-in-law, H. S. Reid, Main
street. Soon after he had retired that
night he came from his room, apparently
choking, and made signs for a drink
of water, which he was unable to swal-
low when it was offered. The ambu-
lance was summoned to convey him to
the hospital, but he died as the vehicle
reached the institution. An autopsy is
being made to determine the cause of
his death.

FASHION ARMOR FOR TROOPS IN ANCIENT SHOP

For several months the armor work-
shop in the Metropolitan Museum of Art
at New York, which dates to the fif-
teenth century and was brought to this
country from France, has been a busy place,

surrounded by tools, anvils, and armor
of the early centuries, a French armor
maker, Daniel Tachaux, whose forefathers
for generations have clung to the dead
trade of the armorer, is working under
the supervision of the ornamental de-
partment. He is endeavoring to develop
practical armor that will turn machine-
gun bullets. Already twenty-five dif-
ferent types of experimental armor have
been patterned. Even arm and leg guards are
included in these defensive devices, all
of which are adaptations of designs
worked out in the days when knights
wore suits of steel.

duced:

Chevalier of the Legion of Honor.
Croix de Guerre with nine barres.
Special War Medal of the Aero Club of America.
Medal of Gold of the Aero Club of France.
Special Medalion of the Imperial Air Fleet Committee of Great Britain.

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All five of these have come to him in the last couple of weeks. "Better put 'em all on, Bill," gently looked his brother-in-law, "and go out and have your picture taken." But posing for the camera adorned in his decorations is not a habit with "Bill" Bishop.

The suggestion was promptly vetoed. "Lieut.-Col. Bishop was more inclined to talk about Capt. Burden than about himself. In fact each showed a disposi-
tion to discuss the other and the other's exploits, rather than his own."

"Capt. Burden is one of our rising young aviators," was the local way the Canadian ace put it. "He has account-
ed for about forty Hun machines, un-
official count."

By dint of cross-questioning, the Star learned that the brothers-in-law have to-
gether a total of about 150 Boche planes to their credit, taking the unofficial count. Of course there is quite a dif-
ference between the official and the un-
official method of counting an aviator's
victories. The aviator may be reason-
ably sure that he has brought down his
man, but unless the fact is observed
from both air and ground he cannot be
credited with the feat. The Germans
are not so careful in their method of
computing their triumphs.

Lieut.-Col. Bishop has an official count
of seventy-two machines downed, and
his brother-in-law is credited with
twenty-nine, but the Bishop total is
really over 100, and the Burden one
forty.
