(No. 1, 1915.)

Cape St. George LIGHT AND FOG ALARM TO BE ESTABLISHED

Lat. 48° 28' N. Approx.
Lon. 60° 15' W. Approx.

POSITION—On the extreme point of Cape St. George.
DESCRIPTION—3 inch Diaphone Alarm, operated by air compressed by Oil Engine.

PERIODS—One blast of 24 seconds duration in every 90 seconds, thus:
First. Silent. Blast. Silent.
2 sec. 57 sec. 24 sec. 57 sec.

STRUCTURES—Engine House, Keeper's Dwelling and Storehouse—each one storey, flat-roofed.

COLOURS—White with one horizontal red band around centre of each building.

REMARKS—This Fog Alarm will be put in operation about 1st September ensuing without further notice.

During this season, without further notice, an occulting White Diaphone Light of the 4th order will be installed in a lantern coloured white, to be placed on the roof of the Fog Alarm Building, the periods of which will be 5 seconds alternate light and eclipse, thus: light, 5 sec.; eclipse, 5 sec. Elevation 95 feet. Visible from all points seaward.

Fort aux Basques—Roadstead, Channel Head

Lat. 47° 33' 49" N.
Lon. 59° 07' 09" W.

Notice is hereby given that additional aids to the navigation of the deep water channel leading into the harbour of Port aux Basques, have been established.

Three spar buoys colored Black with the following distinguishing marks are moored on the Port hand of the channel entering, in the following position:

No. 1—Black Spar Buoy, marked with One White Ring, moored about 100 yards from Channel Head.

No. 2—Black Spar Buoy, marked with two White Rings, moored about 465 yards from No. 1 buoy.

No. 3—Black Spar Buoy marked with Three White Rings, moored about 345 yards from No. 2 buoy.

These 3 buoys are nearly in line, bearing from 1st buoy at Channel Head to No. 3 buoy, N. by W. Mag.

From No. 3 buoy to the Black Spar buoy on Western Bulwark, the bearing is N.W. by N. Mag.

N.B.—Mariners are cautioned against placing undue reliance on buoys being maintained in their exact positions. They must be regarded simply as helps to navigation and not as infallible marks, especially when placed in exposed positions.

The mooring of nets or any other obstruction to the navigation of the fairway outlined by the aids specified herein, is prohibited.

Each of these lights will be shown from a white lantern erected on the roof of the Fog Alarm building.

War News

London, Sept. 7.—East and southeast of Grodno the Russians have taken up new positions across the river Stochwa, and its numerous tributaries, and are protecting a network of railways which run eastward and northward to the interior of the country.

To the southeast among forests and swamps at the northeastern edge of the Pripiat marshes, a great battle is in progress between the army of Prince Leopold of Bavaria, and troops of the Russian centre, the latter, having at last elected to make a stand amid the Pripiat marshes. German Field Marshal Mackensen is working hard for a decisive result. He reports he has taken two Russian positions. Still another battle is being fought for the triangle of fortifications further south, of which Rovno and Dubno remain in the hands of the Russians. The Austrians and Russians are facing each other across the Sereth river in Galicia, where fighting continues. The stand which the Russians are making suggests that their supply of munitions is ample.

A Petrograd correspondent says the ammunition shortage of the Russians has been corrected, and while the production is slow it is incessant.

The British troops have made gains in the Dardanelles. The Russians captured 100 officers and 7,000 men in Galicia, and further progress being made by the French against the only remaining German colonial possession in the Cameroons.

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WAR NEWS

London, Sept. 7.—News that Emperor Nicholas had placed himself at the head of his army, which he announced in a telegram to Raymond Poincaré, President of France on the visit paid by the French Commander in Chief, General Joffre to the Italian army, foreshadowed, it is believed in military circles here, that stirring events both on the eastern and western fronts in which the armies of all the allies will cooperate. It is declared the Russians already are nearly, if not quite holding their own against the Austrians and Germans, whose advance at most points has been brought to a stop, and in places the Russians are carrying on an active offensive.

Riga remains the danger point, but the fact that the Russians continue to occupy the town after the German advance to Drina, southeast of Riga, leads military writers to the conclusion that the Russians feel pretty sure of their ability to defend the river and have time to push sufficiently far westward to relieve the pressure on their forces on the shores of the Gulf of Riga.

Westward of Drineck and Vilna the Russian offensive has held up the Germans for more than a week, and to military observers those two towns seem fairly safe unless the invaders are able to bring up strong reinforcements.

Proclamation

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern and Northern Districts, respectively, of Our Island of Newfoundland; at several times and places hereinafter mentioned;

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden—

At Placentia, on Wednesday, the Eighth, and Thursday, the Ninth days of September next;

At Channel, on Monday, the Thirteenth, and Tuesday, the Fourteenth days of September next;

At St. George's, on Thursday, the Sixteenth, and Friday, the Seventeenth days of September next;

At Bay of Islands, on Saturday, the Eighteenth, and Monday, the Twentieth days of September next.

And that Our said Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden—

At Botwood, on Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of September next;

At Bonaville, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next;

At Trinity, on Tuesday, the Twenty-eighth day of September next;

At Briggs, on Friday, the Nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of November next;

At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth, and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of November next;

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinafter prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinafter appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinafter named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinafter specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinafter stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

D. 1915, and in the Sixth year of Our reign.
